Let of the Roosevelt highway. The job consists of about 10 miles of regrading and resurfacing and the furnishing of crushed gravel in stock piles. The bid was \$194,948.

The Newport Construction company bid a low of \$195,650 for widening and resurfacing in Jackson and Klamath counties.

The Klamath Falls oiling project and construction of 46 miles of bituminous macadam wearing surface in the vicinity of Klamath Falls probably will be awarded J. C. Compton of McMinnville, whose bid was \$129,142 was low out of more than a dozen bids.

The Cochran Construction company, with a bid of \$192,125 provided 6.4 miles of grading on the Glendale-Douglas county line section of the Roosevelt highway.

In Malheur and Harney counties, which constitutes the Vale oiling project, construction of 121 miles of macadam wearing surface and application of 65.3 miles of surface treatment in the vicinity of Huntington, Ontario, Vale, Brokan and Burns, the commission granted the contract to the Cochran Construction company, with a bid of \$169,932.

Cooke Compromise Plan Is Approved

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 27 (AP)—A compromise plan for the settlement of claims against Walter M. Cooke and James P. Cooke, tentatively entered into between them and J. C. Gillingham, trustee for the creditors of the defunct brokerage firm Overbeck and Cooke company, was granted yesterday by a U. S. court judge in bankruptcy.

Under the terms of the settlement the Cookes are to turn over to the estate \$45,000 in cash, jewels, the equity in the Cooke residence. It is expected this will reach in excess of \$60,000.
