Poultry, Fresh
Meat Prices In
Several Changes

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 27 (AP)—Several changes in the prices of poultry and fresh meats, some up, some down, were announced today by a leading produce company.

Medium hens moved up 1c to 22¢, light hens 1c to 20¢, springs 24¢ to 25¢. No. 1 turkeys dropped 2c to 24¢ to 25¢.

Vent went up 1c to 18¢ to 19¢ and pork 1c to 13¢ to 14¢.

Choice lamb was 2c cheaper at 20¢ to 22¢ and mutton also 2c lower at 19¢ to 21¢.

Chicken broilers were beginning to come in at 20¢ to 21¢.

Egg and butter quotations held firm, but unchanged today.

Prices appeared more stable than for several days.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"The lettuce market continues to decline slightly, under the very heavy Imperial valley shipments, and liberal supplies at Portland. A wide range in prices prevailed, from 12¢ to 17¢ per crate to retailers, partly because of variation in quality and freshness of current truck holdings."

"First carlot shipments of spring cauliflower from Roseburg was made Tuesday. California shipments are declining, and the cauliflower market is showing an improved undertone, with local sales for good stock at 11¢ to 12¢ per crate. Quality is improving also."

"Oranges strengthened, with large sizes 25¢ per case higher, while smaller sizes were raised about 10¢."

"Grapefruit supplies during the next few months will probably be largely confined to California and Arizona stock. Texas has practically completed its crop movement, and grapefruit arrivals from Florida are very limited, in amount of undesirable quality of the season's early offerings."

"California asparagus is arriving in more liberal quantities, and further slight declines in sales to retailers are reported."

"Rhubarb is in lighter supply, and cheaper grades were a shade stronger."

"Primary potato markets from Idaho eastward, were slightly weaker, but Oregon and Washington growers were holding at their usual rather high levels."

A window. The Gennaro killing strengthened this theory.

Today, however, detectives were giving more serious consideration to a rumor that Califano was killed because he refused to contribute to a fund being collected to finance an appeal for Fernando, who is serving a 20 to 40-year term for the kidnapping of the five-year-old Thompson boy. Sirica had obtained from the state supreme court a writ which gave him the right to appeal the conviction.

Use Gangster Style

The shooting of Sirica was in characteristic gangster fashion. The attorney was driving on a comparatively quiet street. A small coupe drove alongside, and the volley was fired. The attorney slumped over the wheel and the uncontrolled car sped half a block until stopped by collision with a parked machine.

Two patrolmen, John Maher, and Charles Melton, were near in the patrol car. They gave chase to the gangster's coupe, which quickly disappeared. Another patrolman, Walter Koehler, took up the chase in a commandeered automobile, but with no better success.

The Thompson kidnapping case, in which Sirica's client was convicted, was one of a number in which ransom was paid in Detroit. The boy was held for twenty days last summer and was released for his father, Henry S. Thompson, had paid \$17,000. Fernando, who had \$5,000 of the money in his possession, was one of several suspects arrested, but was the only one ever brought to trial. He was convicted in December.

RALLY TODAY;
CLOSE STEADY

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—Stock prices rallied sharply again today in response to a further recovery in wheat prices and a lowering of the call money rate from 4 1/2 to 4 per cent. More than a score of issues, including several amusement, dairy, business machines, public utility and motor accessory shares, moved into new high ground for the year. Gains of 1 to 8 points were distributed over a fairly broad list, with a sprinkling of issues marked up 1 to 7 points.

Prices headed upward from the opening of the market, the rally gathering momentum as trading progressed. Several of the traders began to take profits in the last hour. Signs of weakness appeared in several leaders, notably American Oil and Ammons. Recoveries from the day's highest point from 1 to 2 points, with U. S. Steel and Westinghouse. Electric among those freely offered, Norfolk and Western declined 7 points. The close was steady. Sales approximated 2,000,000 shares.

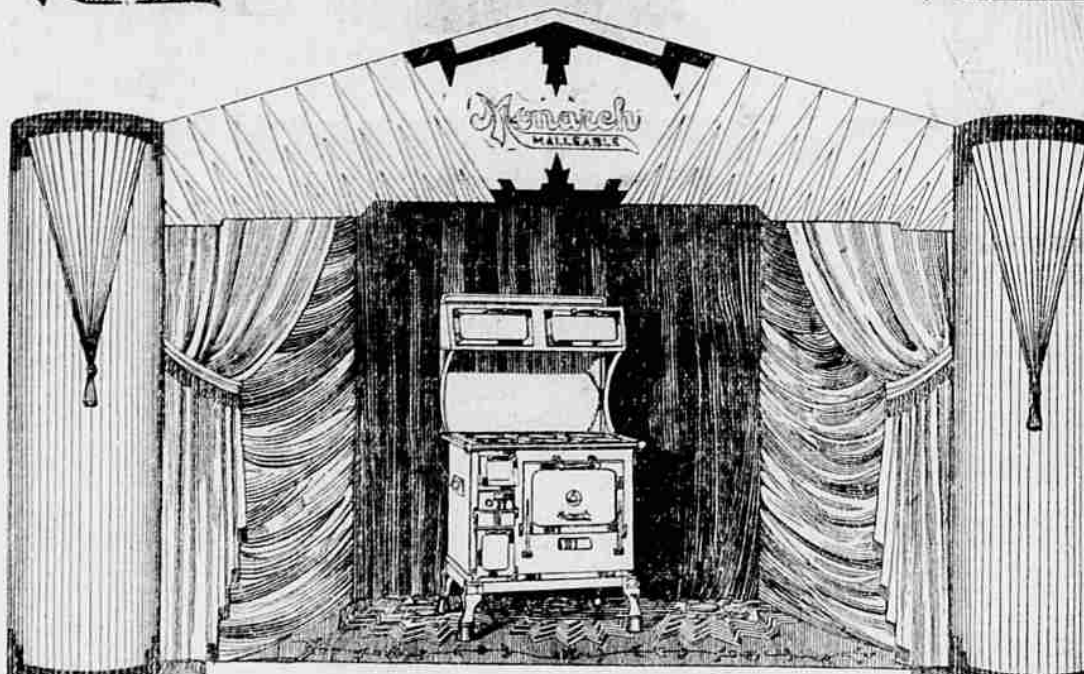
