Kings Passing With Democracy Taking Thrones

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 27 (AP)—Ray Lyman Wilbur, secretary of the Interior, told the members of the department of superintendence of the National Education association in general session here that kings are passing from the stage and democracy is taking their place. How to adjust science to democracy is the task of the times, he said.

"Instead of the favored few we now have the interest of the many to consider," he said, "with limits universally set only by the limits of the human mind. We are breaking down barriers with new truths."

"We are now in an age of science and democracy," continued Wilbur. "The great issue is how to harmonize the two. In democracy a majority decision determines if one or the other course shall be carried out. But science has no majority rule. There is only one rule and that is truth, and its laws control the universe."

"Much of education has been to grope into the brain of a child the fixed thinking of the day. What should be sought is to keep plastic the mental process of youth and adolescence. Our advances through science are so fast that our political, social and economic mechanisms are breaking. Our country is witnessing the incapacity to settle major problems by sheer political procedure. Educators must detect and train suspects, and while we must care for every one capable, the steady rise of the general level of education makes it more imperative that we discover those of exceptional genius. We must be alert or as we know more of nutrition and human management and surround ourselves with more iron and steel and concrete instead of trees, flowers and open spaces, we may become menagerie animals."
