RECOMMEND LEGISLATION

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 1 (AP)—Legislation making extensive changes in the jury system and to prevent abuse of the insanity plea in criminal cases is recommended by the state judicial council, which has filed a report with Governor Norblad. The report follows a meeting of the council here last week.

COALITION IS BLAMED FOR BILL DELAY

The recommendations follow: That defendants in criminal cases be allowed to waive trial by jury and present their cases directly to the court, except in cases where the penalty is death or life imprisonment.

That the jury panel be improved by the appointment of jury commissioners and the examination of prospective jurors under the supervision of the circuit judge.

That persons convicted of crimes on pleas of insanity be sentenced to serve at least three years in an insane hospital without right of habeas corpus.

That the defendant who relies upon a plea of insanity in a criminal case must inform the prosecution before he goes to trial that this will be his defense.

That the number of peremptory challenges of the defendant in a criminal case be reduced to the number allowed prosecution.

Previous hotel connections were with the Heathman and Sovereign in Portland, the Marion at Salem, the Medford at Medford and the Alexander at San Francisco. His first experience was at the Antlers hotel in Baker in 1918.

C. H. Devine will be retained as assistant manager and auditor and no further change in the personnel of the organization is contemplated, it is said.
