SHORT COURSE FOR OFFICIALS WILL BE HELD

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—The relation of service clubs to commercial organizations, and problems of all types will be thoroughly studied by officials of chambers of commerce of Oregon at the annual short course for chamber of commerce secretaries to be held at the University of Oregon, March 21 to 28.

Operation of the federal farm board, foreign trade and many other topics of vital interest to Oregon will be discussed at the short course. It began several years ago by the school of business administration, under the direction of Dean David E. Pavilly, the course has developed rapidly in interest and size of attendance. It is expected that La Grande officials, if they attend the conference, will return with many new ideas for promoting community projects, and with a comprehensive view of what other commercial organizations of the state are doing.

Kent Schumacher, Hood River, president of the state association, has aided in preparing the program, which is believed to be one of the best since the conference was first started. A silver loving cup, awarded by Christy Thomas, manager of the Seattle chamber, will be given to the secretary who turns in the best paper on "Chambers of Commerce Organization."

Of unusual interest this year is the fact that A. S. Dudley, secretary of the Sacramento chamber of commerce and president of the National Association of Chamber of Commerce Secretaries will be present, and will give a talk each day, while Leonard Road, assistant manager of the western division of the United States chamber of commerce, will also address the meeting. Charles F. Walker, district governor of Kiwanis, will deliver an address on the relation of service clubs to commercial organizations, and L. W. Herman, chairman of maritime commerce division of the Portland chamber of commerce will lead the discussion on foreign trade.

PUGILISTIC HOSTS LEAVING FLORIDA

Second Battle of Coconut Palms at Least Removed Scott From Picture

By Alan Gould (Associated Press Sports Editor) MIAMI, Fla., Mar. 1 (AP)—Bag, baggage and ballyhoo, the pugilistic hosts of Madison Square Garden prepared to beat a strategic retreat today from the diamond scene where the second battle of the coconut palms raged and raged.

There has been more artistic failure than this Scott-Sharkey affair. Tex Rickard had his troubles at Toledo in 1919 and the boom town of Shelby, Mont., was hard hit by the flop of the Dempsey-Gibbons bout there in the summer of 1923. But these, at least had glimmer of a championship struggle, no matter what the final sale in the box office.

The lousy setting of this winter's little fiasco had few, if any, redeeming features to offset its financial shortcomings. Those might have been overlooked with a more magnificent gesture by the garden corporation had Jack Sharkey achieved a convincing and decisive victory over Phil Scott, the pallid Briton who seems afflicted with chronic difficulty in the right scintilla nerve. As it was, the battle added no lustre to heavyweight history.

Scott Out of Picture—Scott, all hands concede, no matter whether they think the Briton was felled, has been effectively removed as a heavyweight title contender. That the field is at least reduced by one in the world's most unsatisfactory series of elimination bouts since the retire-

ment of Gene Tunney in the summer of 1928.

Sharkey, the main American hope, though a three-round victor over Scott under extraordinary circumstances, remains an uncertain figure as a fighter of apparent great possibilities but distinctly erratic tendencies in the ring. Sighting, Thursday was the night for this Jacky and Hyde of fist-fights to wage one of his "bad fights."

Not only did he fail to justify the long odds in his favor but actually he came within a shade of losing on a foul. The expert consensus, as a result, is that Sharkey by no means figures to have any advantage over Max Schmeling, the German gladiator, when they meet on June 26 in the deciding heavyweight tilt at New York.

Kansas Acres, Once Arid, Yield Great Returns

TRIBUNE, Kan., (AP)—A Russian immigrant who has sowed 100,000 acres of wheat where only buffalo grass grew before—that is Simon Fishman, who is lifting Western Kansas out of arid wilderness by his own bootstraps.

There are 250,000 acres in Greeley county and Fishman already has developed much of it. In another year he hopes to break up another 100,000 acres for wheat

and corn. It has taken Fishman years to make some of his dreams come true. Thirty years ago he carried a pack through the southwest, peddling wares. When he was 25, owner of a small store at Sidney, Neb., he traded \$100 in merchandise for 160 acres in Colorado.

Unfamiliar with crop diversifications, he planted everything in wheat—but it grew. His big crop met a rock-bottom market in 1914 but he lost everything but a fighting spirit. With a friend's aid more wheat and flax soon came from his farm, and he broke up 40,000 acres more.

Finally his huge elevator went up at Tribune. Now the railroad waits with awe for Simon Fishman's wheat, and that of his neighbors. From an untutored novice in farming he has become a monarch of lands whose yearly output runs into hundreds of thousands of bushels.

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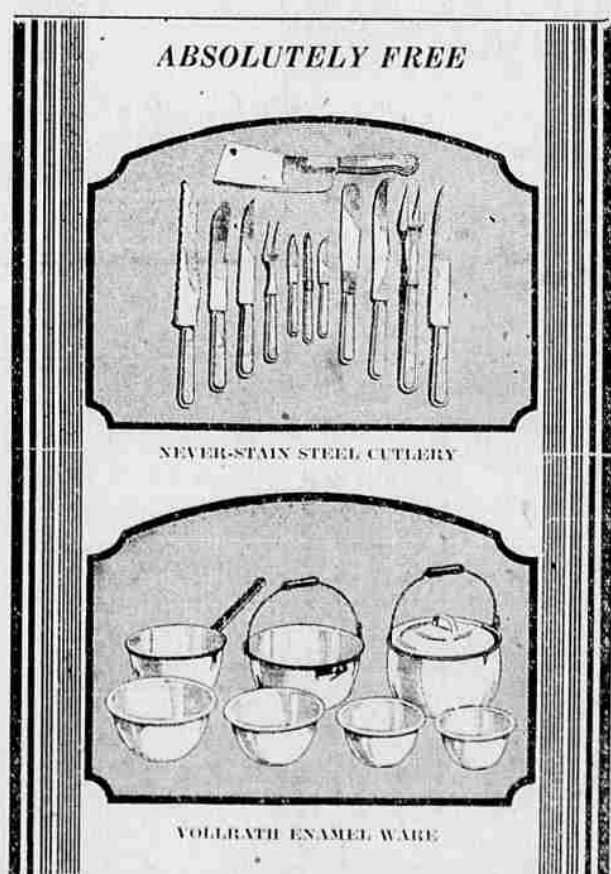
