TEXANS FIND COLLEGE PAYS LARGE DIVIDENDS

DALLAS, (AP)—The value of a school to the city has been computed at Southern Methodist university.

Figures gathered for C. C. Seligman, president of S. M. U., show

the university, its students and their families have spent more than \$20,000,000 in Dallas for the past 15 years.

On the basis of the city's cash investments in the university, \$1,257,000, it is figured that the school has paid more than \$22 for every dollar in cash given by Dallas to maintain the school or dividends of 222 1/2 per cent.

The institution shows the university and its students have spent \$28,415,913 in Dallas in 15 years.

CONGRESS ASKED TO SAVE OLD CENTER INSCRIPTION

MELISSA S. D. (AP)—To preserve an old inscription cut in a rock on Mt. Hylan near in Wyoming by Gen. George A. Buxter, representatives and senators from a half dozen middle western states are being asked to secure funds from the federal government.

The inscription was cut by Senator two years before the massacre of the Little Big Horn. It is endangered by destructive relic hunters, historians here declare.
