ATLANTA PRISON AWAITS RELIEF

Hoover Estimates Peni-
tentiary Houses 120 Per
Cent Over its Capacity

ATLANTA (AP)—The old lady
who lived in the shoe may have
been crowded, but her house was
spacious compared with the federal
prison crouched ponderously in the
outskirts of Atlanta.

Built for a maximum of 1,800
prisoners, the "big house" now
bulges with 4,000 convicts. Presi-
dent Hoover, asking appropriations
for prison extensions, estimated
the number at 120 per cent above
capacity. Single cells serve two
men, and even corridors are used.
In line with President Hoover's
plan to adjust prison population, a
bill passed by the house is seen as
a correction for this condition. It
provides two additional prisons.

stood nearly 20 years with never a

FARM WOMEN IN TEXAS CAN FOOD ON BIG SCALE

TROUP, Tex., (AP)—The annual
earning power of farm women
down here in South county hits six
figures.
Total value of their products for
1929, according to Miss Nettie
Schultz, home demonstration agent
was \$176,738.96. Their preserved
fruits and vegetables, were valued
at \$66,827.
A market maintained by 20
women's clubs with nearly 600
members, and 18 girls' clubs with
387 members, sold products to 24
rural communities. Women in the
county canned nearly 75,000 quarts
of fruits and vegetables, made
clothing valued at \$25,345, and put
up 132,360 pounds of meat.

SISSON VIEWS OWN NATION AS GREATEST TRADE FIELD

NEW YORK (AP)—Great strides

HAT BILL RULING MAKES FRENCH HUSBAND ROSS

LYON, France, (AP)—Woman
and her hats have been "put in
their right place" by French juris-
prudence.
Milliners who sell a woman more
hats than her husband can afford
can't collect.
A wife can exceed unduly the
normal family budget, only with
her husband's specific authority.
With those as principles, the civil
tribunal reduced from \$2,300 to
\$400 the year's bill for hats of
Madame X. Because of public ridi-
cule newspapers agreed not to use
the family name.
Madame X bought hats on credit.
The milliner put in his bill. The
husband refused to pay. Came the
lawsuit.
Judge Goyet found the husband
owed \$2,000 a year, with other in-
come of \$1,200.
So the judge decided the husband
knowing his income, would never
have authorized such purchases,
and reduced the bill to \$400.

CHICAGO BUILDING HITS 155 MILLIONS

CHICAGO, (AP)—Chicago's
spring building program, exclu-
sive of home building and re-
modeling, calls for an expendi-
ture of \$155,775,000, according to
the building construction ex-
plorers' association. This in-
cludes \$12,000,000 for a new post-
office building and \$5,000,000 for
buildings for the 1932 world's fair.

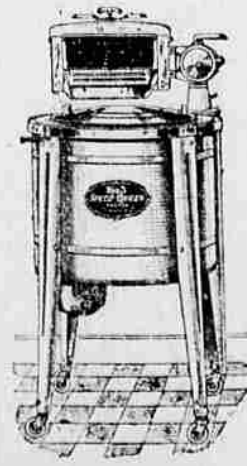
