Rumors that Charles Hall will withdraw from the race for governor seem to lack foundation. He is perfecting his organization and numerous men are making sacrifices to go to bat for him—doing things they would not do if he were considering retirement. So far, no one expects Hall to run better than third, but he might accomplish a good deal to change this in the next two months.

In Los Angeles Calvin Coolidge attracts no less, and probably no more, attention than any former president would when visiting in a new country. Mr. Coolidge and his charming and competent wife have conducted themselves excellently in the face of curiosity crowds. The crowds, on the other hand, haven't done so well. Men, women and children fought over the possession of a cigar butt that Mr. Coolidge casually threw into the gutter. A woman successfully captured this souvenir and the ex-president smiled. Which makes one wonder whether he smiled at the indicated tribute or at the insanity of people who fawn upon the great and near-great.

The new grange bill that would provide for a lieutenant governor and give him the job of presiding and appointing officer for the state senate is being questioned by numerous publications. What would this power to appoint legislative committees do to our legislative machinery? It might have serious effects, but one wonders if the committees appointed by a lieutenant governor would be any worse, on the average, than those appointed by a president of the senate. One man would be elected directly by the people, the other by the senators from among their own number. It seems likely that the responsibility to the people would be a better check on the former than the press of politics would on the latter. One thing is sure, we need a lieutenant governor for emergencies. We are in favor of that part of the bill, anyhow.

HOW IS YOUR HEALTH?

We have all speculated on what would be the three best wishes we could make if some fairy godmother gave us assurance that they would be fulfilled. In perhaps every case good health is one of the wishes. We all feel certain that without good health nothing else would be worth much.

But however firmly we may cling to this conviction, our actions do not always indicate that we greatly desire this blessing. We are not always willing to make the little sacrifice in time and thought which we must make if we are to remain in good health. The individual is rare indeed who gives any thought to his physical welfare until he finds failing in health, and the farther we have gone into a state of ill health, the more firmly we resolve to guard ourselves against ailments in the future.

The situation is serious enough to demand attention, both from the individual and from the social group. "It is very unusual today," said a health expert recently, "to find an adult of 40 years who is normal physically." And though not all of us may admit it in our own case, this assertion confirms a belief which is not only common among health experts, but which is possible of proof.

"We are trying to educate the public to give their bodies the same careful attention that they give their automobiles," said Dr. John Sunwall, University of Michigan professor of hygiene.

This is all the more remarkable because all of us appreciate what a fine thing good health is. We never tire of praising the individual who is blessed in this way. "The very picture of health" is a phrase in common use among us. We glory in what this or that individual can do at 50 or 60 years of age, and are discouraged when our own physical body does not respond so readily at 45 as it did at an earlier age. Regular physical examinations and strict following of doctors' orders would help a lot—but that's quite a difficult job for most of us, to begin with.
