Miss Lois Nelson, of La Grande, has been chosen chairman of a "music cooperation committee" organized in an effort to increase the interest of the University of Oregon student body in the musical events given for the students during the year.

The appointment was made by Tom Stoddard, student body president, who said that the lack of interest among the students as a whole in musical events of this year caused the student administration to feel that this situation should be remedied and that steps should be taken to have the students realize the value of the musical programs, most of them of very high caliber, which are presented periodically on the campus. "We feel that this is a situation which can be greatly improved by the intelligent use of publicity that will reach individual students more effectively than the usual newspaper stories," Mr. Stoddard remarked.

**BOB KRUSE WINS**

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6—(AP)—Bob Kruse, Portland, won two out of three falls from Charles Struck, Stillwater, Okla., in their heavyweight wrestling match here last night. Kruse took the first fall in 38 minutes, 30 seconds with a wristlock. Struck evaded matters by taking the second fall in five minutes with a back trip and body press. Kruse won the final fall in 12 minutes with an airplane spin.
