Little Priscilla Proctor, who recently broke her leg by a fall from the playground shutes here, is convalescing nicely.

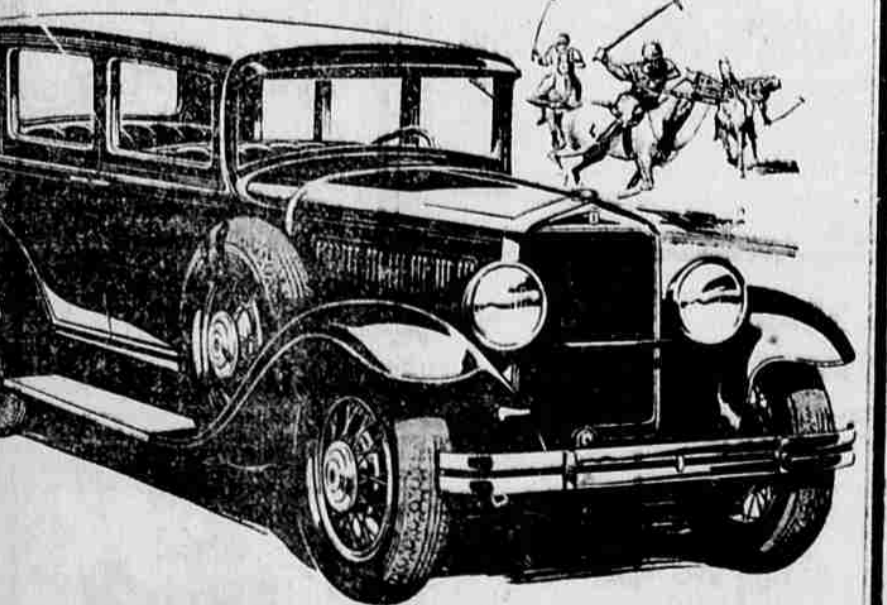
