Population Of 3 Institutions 2026

SALEM, Ore., March 6—AP—The population of three state institutions reached record-breaking high totals during the last month, reports made by the superintendent to the state board of control yesterday showed.

The population of the state hospital for the insane passed the 2000 mark for the first time and today is 2026. At the state penitentiary the peak was reached of 809, and 854 inmates were reported at the state institution for the feeble-minded.

Henry W. Meyers, superintendent of the penitentiary, reported that the gross receipts from prison industries from April 1, 1927 when he took charge, to January 1, 1930, was \$168,442.92.

Old Legend of the Sea
