USE DIRIGIBLE TO TEST AIR CURRENTS FOR GERMS

AKRON, O., (AP) — Last the dirigible as a new ally of preventive medicine.

Charles Barton of the Los Angeles board of health used the semi-rigid dirigible "Volunteer" of the Good-year fleet to go aloft for samples of air. He found the ship valuable because it could be held almost stationary.

Barton took cultures at 4,500 feet, 2,500, 2,000 and 1,000 feet over Los Angeles and at 2,500 feet above a rural region.

Over the city he found no bacillus that he could identify as disease-producing. Over the country he found some that probably are disease-producing, along with subtilus, or hay bacillus.

DENTIST'S AIR HAMMER DROVE PILING IN TEETH

CHICAGO (AP) — A dentist is credited with patenting the first pneumatic hammer, now con-

struction's chief ally in the hands of the riveter.

Vulcanizing of rubber, boon to the automobile tire industry, first was introduced by a dentist, says Dean Arthur D. Black, of Northwestern university's dental school, who is responsible for the pneumatic hammer claim.

The air hammer was used to drive fillings into cavities, and the rubber vulcanizing was employed in making false teeth.

NEW GERMAN FLOUR RAY CLAIMED DISEASE CURE

HAMBURG (AP) — A new pro-

cedure for vitalizing food is claimed by a grain company here.

Dr. von Hahn, director of the biological-colloid station of the Eppendorfer hospital, says the process utilizes radiation to produce vitamins for specific use in disease. He says flour so treated can be baked directly into bread which is good for rickets.

An attempt will be made to utilize the process on fruit as an antidote for the dreaded sailors' disease, scurvy.
