Repeat Pioneer Program Sunday In Local Church

Soviet Designs Model City In Hoper Province

MOSCOW (AP)—Just what the campaign for "complete socialization of Russia" would mean to its citizens is to be illustrated in a model socialist agricultural city which is to be erected by the government in the Hoper province, lower Volga district.

Summed up, the project calls for a mode of life of a bit more impersonal than that which exists in peace time. Only clothing and the pocket knickknacks which the individual carries about with him will be private property. All else will belong to the commune.

Standardized living quarters for infants, school children and adults will keep each of these three classes apart from the others except for visits of parents to children or vice versa. Mothers will be "freed" from the duty of nursing and caring for their babies.

The women will not even have to cook meals for their mates as one gigantic "kitchen factory," situated on the outskirts of the community, will prepare the food for all the 44,000 people who are expected to take part in the experiment. This food will be distributed to restaurants of which there will be one in each communal residence or group of houses. Thus all will fare alike.

Professor Williams of the Timiryazevsky Agricultural Institute here, heads a committee of experts engaged in planning the model rural town. He said it would be located in the center of a huge "collective" farm of nearly 500,000 acres.

The population of about 44,000 will consist of farm laborers who will be members of the community, and workers in the different enterprises serving them with food, shelter, clothing, medical attendance, amusement, education and recreation.

All houses will be of the same type and will consist of living quarters, a general dining room, club rooms, library and gymnasium. For each ten of these houses there will be a separate laundry and shops for making and repairing the furniture and other equipment.

Besides the permanent apartments, a thousand or more movable houses will be utilized in the busy planting and harvest seasons. These will be erected in the fields and transferred from place to place as the work requires. They will serve as living quarters for the farmers and thus spare them the daily journey from town and back during the rush season.

On the outskirts, separated from the townships by parks, will be a number of government factories where butter, cheese, bacon, sugar and other by-products of agriculture will be manufactured. The

entire process of labor will be mechanized, tractors and other modern machinery taking the place of horses and hand tools.

ADVENTURER TO FOLLOW FRANCIS DRAKE'S TRAIL

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A modern Sir Francis Drake, in a counter-part of the sea adventurer's ship, the Golden Hind, plans to sail from Miami to retrace the Englishman's course on a winter cruise in the West Indies.

Lee H. Parish, of Beaumont, Tex., is the sailor. With his father and mother he will cruise five months in search of rare mammals, birds and reptiles for the Smithsonian institution. His ship, the Esperanza, is an auxiliary ketch.

Parish will search not only for animal specimens, but will seek a mysterious cave at the east end of Tortuga. Along the north coast of Haiti he will search for lost Indian villages believed to hold traces of ancient life.

SAYS HALF MILLION VOLT LINE POSSIBLE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal. (AP)—Power transmission of half a million volts, more than double that of present lines, now is feasible, says Prof. Harris J. Ryan, director of the 2,000,000-volt laboratory of Stanford university.

Such huge power lines, how-

ever, are not yet practical, he declares.

"Even so," says Prof. Ryan, "one may engage in speculation as to what uses can be made of the half-million volt power line."

"Interconnections of powers and markets are now being organized from Chicago to the Atlantic and Gulf states and from Canada to Mexico on the Pacific coast. Executives and engineers promulgating such interconnections may be the first to encounter need for the half-million volt line for equalizing power sources and markets between industrial areas."

YALE PRESIDENT STRICKEN

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 6 (AP)—Death has overtaken Dr. Arthur Twining Hadley, president emeritus of Yale university, in Kobe, Japan, during a world cruise. He was 73 years old and president of the university from 1899 to 1921.

Stricken with pneumonia, the noted educator, writer, lecturer and economist died yesterday after a two-day illness.

MISS WALTON RESIGNS

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 5 (AP)—Miss Beatrice Walton late yesterday confirmed a report, emanating from Portland, that she had resigned as private secretary to Governor Norblad. She said the resigna-

tion was submitted February 29 and would be effective March 15. She said she promised the governor to withhold publication of the resignation for a time to save the executive embarrassment. She added that her plans were uncertain.

While in Astoria yesterday the governor is quoted as saying he probably would announce the appointment of Miss Walton's successor within 48 hours.
