## OREGON STATE SCHEDULE HAS SIXTEEN GAMES

CORVALLIS, Ore., Mar. 7 (AP)—Oregon State college will play a 16-game schedule in conference baseball this year, opening on its home grounds against the University of Oregon April 21, according to the schedule just released by Carl Lotell, graduate manager.

Pro-season games on dates not definitely set will be played with Willamette, Oregon Normal and Columbia university at Portland. The conference schedule this year returns to the plan of several years ago whereby each of five northern division teams plays four games with each opponent, just as was done this year with the basketball schedule. The change from the divided northern section as followed last year is made possible through the withdrawal of Montana from conference competition in these sports.
