## REICHSBANK HEAD TO QUIT HIS POSITION

BERLIN, March 7 (AP)—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reichsbank, today announced his intention of resigning from his post.

The announcement was made at a meeting of directors of the Reichsbank this afternoon.

Dr. Schacht informed the directors that he had taken steps to terminate his presidential contract with the bank before his expiring date but would remain in office until his successor was appointed.

The resignation, it was understood, was due to his personal interpretation of the final protocol reached at the second Hague conference on reparations, which he claimed made changes in the original plan such as to endanger its success.

## Jealousy Motive For Killing Two

LEON, March 7 (AP)—Lee Dambinski, 24, shot and killed his wife and Dr. J. L. Curtis, 47, a negro physician, early today when he returned home from an errand for medicine on which the physician had sent him.

Mr. Dambinski, 26, was the mother of three children and expecting a fourth. Dr. Curtis was 47 years old and married. After the killing Dambinski called police and surrendered.

## Wife of Artist Killed; Indian Woman Arrested

RUFFALO, N. Y., March 7—(AP)—Arrested in the brutal slaying of Mrs. Henri Marchand, wife of the famous artist and curator of the Buffalo museum of science, an Indian woman alleged to have been intoxicated with the artist today blamed the killing on an older woman of her tribe.

Police detectives said Miss Lilian Jimezon, 35, full blood Indian whom Mr. Marchand had used for a model, admitted she was present in the Marchand home yesterday when Mrs. Marchand was beaten and choked to death, but maintained she did not kill her. Police did not make public the name of the woman she accused, who also is under arrest.

Mrs. Marchand was found dead by her 12-year-old son when he returned from school. Her head was battered by blows from a sharp pointed weapon and a chloroform soaked wad of paper was found jammed in the woman's throat.

once more to the program of the navy. Before the meeting M. Ireland had a brief conference with Ramsay MacDonald, British prime minister and general chairman of the conference.

British Naval Estimates LONDON, Mar. 6 (AP)—British naval estimates for 1930, made public Thursday, shows a net total of £51,739,000 against £55,865,000 for 1929, or a reduction of £4,126,000. The British pound has a value of about \$4.85.

A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, in a statement accompanying the estimate said the substantial decrease was due principally to reductions which the government felt justified in making in the shipbuilding program of 1928 and 1929 in accordance with a policy already stated in parliament—that is, trimming of naval build-

ing to meet decreased needs produced by the Kellogg Pact and other peace instruments. Summarizes Reductions He summarized the reductions as follows: Five vessels of the 1928 program have been cancelled, namely, two cruisers of the 19,000-ton type with 8-inch guns, two submarines and one submarine depot ship.

Twelve vessels of the program of 1929 have been cancelled, namely, two cruisers, four torpedo-boat destroyers, three submarines, two destroyers and one net-layer and target-towing vessel. One of the cruisers cancelled is of the 18,000-ton type with 8-inch guns. He said that in addition decision whether the three remaining submarines of the 1929 program are to be proceeded with has been deferred until after the London naval conference.
