Spring Practice Is Completed At The University

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 10 (AP)—A single comment—that there was only one expression from Dr. Clarence W. Spence as he closed the first period of spring football practice at the University of Oregon today. The rigorous two weeks' drill, however, was but a prelude to the heavy program to extend through six weeks at the opening of the spring term of school next week.

The former Minnesota coach's introduction to the Wekford football team was characterized by a comparatively quiet and irregular turnout of candidates. The work of conditioning the team for the arduous campaign of next fall was hindered by the press of approaching term examinations but next month the full squad of 22 players signifying their intention of reporting will be expected to report.

With the addition of John O'Brien of the Western State Teachers' college at Kalamazoo, Mich., the full coaching staff will be present. O'Brien, who played under Doc Spence at Minnesota, will take over the end coaching position. The remainder of the work will be distributed to Bill Heinhart, backfield; Gene Shields, line; and Frank Gillson, freshman coach, who has come over to the varsity for spring work.

HUSKIES DEFEAT TROJANS 36 TO 31

Washington Takes Saturday Game—Two Teams Meet in Finals Tonight

The question of the Pacific coast conference basketball championship is to be settled here tonight when the University of Washington quiet takes the court against the University of Southern California in the third game of the title series.

The Huskies from the north, winners of their division, Saturday night posted a 26 to 21 victory over the champions of the southern section after the Trojans had won the initial clash in an impressive 46 to 21 triumph.

Expert basket marksmanship which followed the first game slump in scoring activities was responsible for the remarkable comeback of Coach Joe Edmundson's losers after the first game defeat which seemed to point to certain victory for U. S. C. five and with it the championship.

The Men of Troy had fished a fast passing-attack to flush the invaders off their feet in the early quarter but the overnight re-formation of the Huskie man-of-war defense stopped Coach Sam Barry's proteges in their tracks to even the count.

In the same fashion that the Washington five tossed away its chances on throws that failed to connect Friday, the Trojans frittered away the opportunity to make it two straight and annex the title in the second meeting.

While the decisiveness of the U. S. C. win coupled with the comparatively close finish of the second game points to the Trojans as favorites, the fact remains that if Hal "Stork" McClary, giant Huskie center, and small Stanley Jairo, his tiny forward running mate, the functioning as they were Saturday night, all may not see so well in the U. S. C. ranks.

Victory for Washington would mean the first championship for the Huskies in the three years they have annexed first place honors in the northern division. Last year California limited them and in 1928 the Trojans won the title by taking the first two games.

trict championship, was off for about four hours. In the afternoon, Wallowa declined to play but Saturday night reconsidered, and the game was on again. Reports that the game would not be played caused a much smaller crowd to gather than was expected. The championship game plan was favored overwhelmingly by the teams in the sub-district, even of them voting for it earlier in the tournament.

Tigers Have Fighting Chance

The Tigers' showing put them in the position of having a fighting chance to come out on top at Union, although Baker still remains the favorite for the district title and the trip to Salem.

La Grande took a 7 to 0 lead before Wallowa found the basket and at the end of the quarter was ahead 12 to 4. In the second period Wallowa scored five while the blue and white score was advanced to 24. The third period ended 40 to 18 and the scoring ceased up in the final frame, with La Grande making five and Wallowa three. Torrence and Paine were consistently stopping Wallowa's drives with the others also checking closely.

The drawings for placings in the Union tournament are to be held at the La Grande High school at 8 o'clock tonight. The first games will be played at 8 and 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the second two of the first round at 8:20 and 9:20 o'clock.

Cove Shows Well

In the afternoon games, Cove gave La Grande a stiff battle but lost 27 to 23, and Enterprise at most upset Wallowa, being nowed out 32 to 29. At half time the Savages were trailing 18 to 19 but outplayed the Wallowa team 19 to 14 during the remainder of the game.

Roe High Scorer In Sub-District Basket Tourney

Leonard Roe, La Grande guard, scored 23 points against Wallowa Saturday night in the sub-district tournament finals to clinch the position of high point man for the two-day competition. His total was 42.

Roe scored 21 points against Elgin in the first game, nine against Cove in the second, and then 23 against Wallowa.

Second to Roe was Darrid Weimer, Cove sophomore forward, who counted 24. Weimer scored 17, 12 and 5 in the three games he played. These were the only two men who passed the 20-point mark.

Other high scorers follow: Sannar, Enterprise, 27; Shepherd, La Grande, 20; Parent, Union, 19.

In personal fouls, Wallowa and Enterprise, qualified as the "bad boys", making 23 each in three games played. La Grande was second with 21 personal.

In the three-game team, Cove played the cleanest ball with 10 personal fouls and Elgin was next with 29, in two games. Joseph led with only personal.

Elmer was credited with 23 and Union 24.
