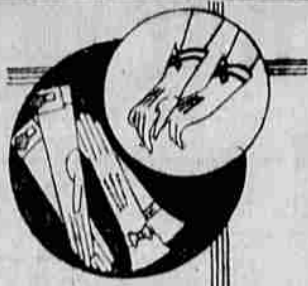

**TITLE GOES TO
TROJAN QUINTET**

Southern California Defeats Washington 37 to 29 in Final Contest.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 11 (AP)—Three winners of the northern division honors, the case quintet from the University of Washington is en route home today for the third time in as many years with the championship of the Pacific coast conference, captured from its longtime foe.

The University of Southern California basketball sharpshooters turned the trick here last night by winning the deciding game of the title series, 27 to 29, after the two quintets had divided honors in the first and second contests. The Trojans bowed to a 26 to 31 defeat Saturday night after a 46 to 31 triumph in the initial battle.

Two years ago it was a U. S. C. aggregation which sent the Huskies back to the north without the championship while the Bears of California turned the trick a season ago.

Defense Responsible
In the final analysis, the airtight defense displayed by Coach Sam Barry's troopers was responsible for the failure of the third at-

tempt of the Washington crew, but only after they had put up a determined struggle which kept the watchful Trojan board at their southern scoring thrusts.

The deciding tosses saw the Men of Troy take the initial lead in last night's thrilling engagement, a lead which they never relinquished. Though their opponents stormed the starboard defense line and again only to see the greater share of their basketward shots go awry.

At in the first (all the U. S. C. centers played a seemingly leisurely game when in possession of the ball, awaiting the opening which allowed them to filter through for close up tosses at the hoop.

With the goal guarded Coach Barry's players rushed in again and again to score.
