Give Figures On Stocks of Grain On Farms Mar. 1

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11 (AP)—Stocks of grain on farms Mar. 1 announced by the department of agriculture included 388,469,000 bushels of corn, or 37.7 per cent of the 1929 crop, and 129,165,000 bushels of wheat, or 16 per cent of last year's crop.

These stocks compared with 1,021,873,000 bushels of corn, or 26.3 per cent of the 1925 crop, and 151,259,000 bushels of wheat, or 16.5 per cent of the previous year's crop, on farms March 1, last year.

It was estimated the proportion of last year's corn crop shipped or to be shipped, out of the country where grown is 16.3 per cent, compared with 19.8 per cent of the 1928 crop and 59.5 per cent of the wheat crop, compared with 75.5 per cent of the 1928 crop.

The percentage of last year's own crop which was of merchantable quality was 77 per cent, compared with 82.1 per cent of the 1928 crop.

The stocks of other grains on farms March 1 were: Oats 329,222,000 bushels, or 32.2 per cent of the crop, compared with 497,343,000, or 34.5 per cent of the 1928 crop so held a year ago.

Barley, 72,280,000 bushels, or 22.9 per cent, compared with 97,167,000 or 21.4 per cent. Rye, 2,540,000 bushels, or 13.2 per cent, compared with 5,724,000, or 55 per cent.

UTILITIES TO MEET PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 11 (AP)—The state public service commission issued a call for all electric utilities officials in Oregon to be present in Portland April 2 to testify on readjustment of farm lines service and extensions.

The commission wants the power companies to assume the capital investment and not request farmers to build the line.

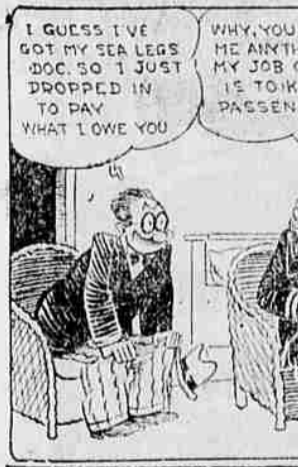
