Churches Plan Fine Programs For Lord's Day

Interesting Sermons Announced by La Grande Houses of Worship for Coming Sunday.

At the First Presbyterian church, the Ladies Guild choir will sing an anthem at the morning 11 o'clock service. Mrs. C. S. Moore, soprano, will sing the solo, "Fear Not Ye, Oh Israel," by Dudley Buck. The minister, the Rev. George W. Hall, will speak on "The Gospel Invitation." Mrs. R. G. McCall will play the morning service.

At 6:20 o'clock, the Christian Endeavor will meet, and at 7:30 o'clock the minister will speak, the choir will sing and Miss Gladys Miller will play the service, presenting "Cherries" by Matthews and "Japanese Sunset" by Deppen.

The Sunday school meets at 9:45 o'clock.

Methodist Episcopal

All the services will be held at the Methodist church Sunday, beginning with the Bible school at 9:45 o'clock. Morning service of

worship at 11 o'clock with preaching by Miss Mabelle Ellen Twiss. Epworth League will meet at 6:30 o'clock and will be followed by the discussion of "Racial Relations." This study started by the late pastor, Rev. V. E. Hall, will be continued and all are urged to be present for the concluding studies of the series. This study hour following immediately by the league service will be held in place of the regular evening service.

First Baptist Church
