Several names are before the president from the south, including Senator George, of Georgia; Judge Samuel Sibley of the federal court for the northern district of Georgia; Walter G. Stacy, justice of the North Carolina supreme court; and Judge John J. Parker, of the federal circuit court of appeals, fourth district. All of these are democrats except Parker.
White House callers also have gained the impression that the president will seek to avoid a man aligned with the extremist ranks of either liberalism or conservatism.
Some Favor Borah
There are prospects of strong movements for both Senator Borah, of Idaho, and Judge William S. Kenyon, of the federal circuit court and a former republican senator from Iowa. Both are identified with the liberal class. Borah waged the fight against the confirmation of Chief Justice Hughes.
But if those who believe the president will avoid the issue recently raised in the senate in the Hughes fight are correct, he probably will choose a man who is not identified with that contest.
The name of John W. Davis, democratic presidential nominee of 1924 and prominent lawyer, continues to be heard in the discussion. Mr. Davis comes from West Virginia, although much of his practice has been in New York of recent years.

even in the ten states involved in the tabulation.
"No one should be elated or discouraged by them. Many fluctuations, perhaps startling ones, may be expected to occur in the voting before the last gun is fired.
"Every incoming mail brings a greater flock of votes to be sorted out by our army of tally clerks, while the outgoing waves of blank ballots are still running high.
"Extraordinary public interest meanwhile is being focused on the poll and everything connected with it. This is largely due, of course, to the dominance of prohibition as a burning question.
A peevish national prohibitionist of considerably smaller magnitude was taken by The Literary Digest in 1922. The first tabulated returns of that poll showed 34,657 votes counted. Of these 22,455 favored strict enforcement; 23,645 favored modification; and 22,547 voted for repeal of the prohibition amendment.

Health Talks
WHAT IS A TOXIN?
The term toxin, or toxic appears often enough in every day conversation and literature to merit definition.
A toxin in common language is meant to indicate a substance injurious to the human body. Toxic, then, is used to indicate the fact that the substance partakes of the qualities of a toxin.
There are many toxic substances, and many substances which in small quantities are not injurious, but may prove poisonous in great concentration, or in large

amounts. Common table salt is an illustration of this. Alcohol may be considered as a toxic substance, and indeed, we do say that a person is "intoxicated."
To the physician, however, it is the bacterial toxins that are of greatest interest. For they are at the root of disease causation, and a knowledge of their constitution and action enables him to understand the nature of a number of important diseases, and also arm him with the instruments for the effective control of a number of deadly diseases.
When the germ causation of diseases was first established it was thought that the mere presence of the germs in or on the body was enough to account for the existing disease. Later, however, it was found that germs might indeed be found both on and in the bodies of individuals who were not at all ill.
Something more than the mere presence of the germs, therefore, is required to produce illness.
All disease-producing bacilli give off poisons and it is these poisons which produce disease. Only few germs are known to give off toxins in a manner similar to the diphtheria bacillus. The vast majority of the disease-producing bacteria do not belong to this group. None the less, all disease-producing germs may be said to be poisonous to the body. Precisely how is still a subject of dispute among scientists.

The housewife who must use the same fundamental foods over and over again will find that clever seasoning will do much to break the monotony of the necessary repetition.
Although "high" seasoning should never be used to cover up poor food or poor cooking, the right use of spices, herbs and condiments will add zest and give additional relish to good wholesome foods. Many famous cooks rely on the wise use of these ingredients as one of the secrets of their art.
The natural pungent flavoring properties of certain foodstuffs stimulate appetite, create a desire for food, and in starting the flow of digestive juices are very real aids to digestion.
Many seasonings are available in the dried state. Some of them may be used green as garnishes or relishes in salads, as well as in cooking. Success in their use depends more on the right combination of flavors than on any artificial or painstaking preparation. The one exception is curry powder, which must be carefully and thoroughly cooked in a special way to bring out its full flavor.
Season With Care
Restraint always must be practiced in the use of seasonings. Only enough should be used to bring out the flavor of the food being seasoned.
As one studies and enlarges the list of seasonings, many new uses for condiments will be discovered.
The leaves of farragon have a hot, pungent taste. They are commonly used to flavor vinegars for salads, but a few finely chopped leaves are very good in tartar sauce.
The leaves of dill are a flavorful addition to fish, egg, cheese or meat salad. Cooked with fish, they give a pleasant pungency.
Fennel has a hot, sweet flavor reminding one of anise. A few seeds add spiciness to fruit pies and baked fruit. The leaves, fresh or dried, are often used for seasoning fish. Fresh fennel sometimes is served as a substitute for celery.
Marjoram is used either fresh or dry for flavoring soups and stews and in the stuffing for all meats and fish.
Sage ordinarily is used in poultry and meat dressings, but it is also good in cheese dishes and vegetable combinations. The flow-
