Foreign primary markets are slightly easier for the week. In the west, the situation is quiet, both dealers and the national co-operative having eased upon their drive for pre-shearing."

Wheat Irregular At Closing Today

CHICAGO, Mar. 14 (AP)—Portentous increase of adverse crop reports owing to generally dry weather southwest and west did much to rally wheat prices today toward the last. Some improvement of export call for North American wheat was also a late stimulating factor, estimates being that 750,000 bushels had been purchased today from Europe, and that some demand for United States hard winter wheat in evidence. Threats of a railroad tieup in Argentina and of political delays in

wheat shipments from India were a subject of comment and there were rumors that for the first time since last fall North American barley and rye have been bought for export.

Wheat closed irregular, ranging from 1 1/2c off to 1 1/2c up compared with yesterday's finish.

Braggins and David Bunnin, both of Cleveland, were killed in an airplane crash near Cleveland airport today, officials of the Curtiss-Wright flying service said. Cause of the accident had not been determined. Both men were employees of the flying service.

CITIES SEEK MORE MONEY

SALTBURG, Ore., Mar. 14 (AP)—The league of Oregon cities is asking the city councils of the state to adopt resolutions asking the legislature for an act whereby a greater percentage of road tax money collected in cities shall be returned to the cities. At present the cities receive back 25 per cent.

ALTITUDE RECORD BROKEN

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14 (AP)—The National Aeronautic association announced today that the bureau of standards' calibration of the barograph used on the flight of Beria Zerkovskiy, seeking a new world altitude record at New York March 1, showed an altitude of 19,982 feet compared to the old record of 19,327 feet.
