BAKER HIGH WINS TITLE IN TOURNNEY

figure in the Baker scoring with 12 points, and Row, of La Grande, led his team mates with five. Baker led at half time 8 to 6, after the Tigers finished the first quarter with 6 to Baker's 3. Guarding was again the feature, with Torrence and Paus checking Baker threats constantly. Wallawa started out with a quiet, scoring four points before La Grande counted, in the evening consolation finals. At the end of the first quarter, Wallawa led 8 to 4, but at half time the Tigers had the edge, 15 to 10. Wallawa rallied, and with about half a minute to go, the score was tied at 21, when Torrence broke through the Wallawa defense and shot the winning field basket. Mired, La Grande forward, was high point man with 8.

Union Gives Baker Score—In the finals, Union gave the confident Baker team a score in the first half, which ended 15 to 15, after the score had been tied twice. But in the last half, with McKim shooting from almost any angle, and his team mates getting an occasional field goal, the Wallawas drew away from their lighter opponents.

In the first game in the afternoon, Wallawa made a desperate bid for a chance to play in the finals, but a shot from near the foul line by Parent, a split second before the gun, gave Union a two-point margin. Wallawa was ahead at the end of the third quarter, 17 to 14, but a scoring rally tied up the score with about a minute left to play. Bodoin and Parent scored four field goals each.

Successful Tourney—Taking the tournament as a whole, it was most successful, with large crowds daily, and with several very close games. The three teams that showed unexpected strength were La Grande, Union and Cove. Union and La Grande both held Baker to close scores and both defeated Wallawa, while Cove put up an excellent game, defeating Mount Vernon and being eliminated by Wallawa by a two-point margin. Ontario, a strong team, was handicapped by the absence of the coach, who was ill, or the southerners might have gone further. Baker, favored to win before the tourney, ran into some tough opposition, but managed to weather the storm.

Officiating was by R. A. Cucha and Al French, both well known referees over the state. Mr. French, who has refereed at the state tournaments regularly, stated, during a luncheon Thursday noon at Union, that the district tournament there ranked next to the state tourney in point of interest and the way it is conducted. The officiating throughout was of the same high standard as of past tourneys.

Sportsmanship shown throughout the tournament, both by spectators and participants, was of a high order.

Joelin High Scorer—With the exception of Baker, which goes to Salem next week, the tournament officially ended the 1929 basketball season in this section.

In scoring through the tournament, Joelin, of Baker, was high with 43, Hansen and Pine, of Wallawa, tied for second with 29. Roe, La Grande, and McKim, of Baker, were even for third with 26 each. Parent and Gilks, of Union, each scored 21.
