- STEAMED MEAT CAKES**
Menu for Dinner
- Steamed meat cakes baked potatoes
 - Broccoli
 - Butter
 - Head lettuce and Relish Dressing
 - Apple Pudding
 - Cream
 - Coffee
- Steamed Meat Cakes**
(Using leftovers)
- 2-3 cup chopped cooked meat.
 - 1 cup soft bread crumbs.
 - 2 tablespoons finely chopped onions.
 - 2-3 cup tomatoes.
 - 1-4 teaspoon salt.
 - 1-4 teaspoon pepper.
 - 2 eggs.
 - 1 tablespoon butter, melted.
 - 1-2 cup meat stock or water.
- Mix ingredients and pour into small baking pans or timbale pans. Set in pan of hot water and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold carefully.
- Water in the pan will steam the meat cakes.

 - 1-4 teaspoon dry mustard.
 - 1-4 teaspoon celery seed.
 - 1-4 teaspoon paprika.
 - 4 tablespoons lemon juice.
 - 1-3 cup salad oil.
 - 2 tablespoons catsup.
 - 2 tablespoons horseradish.
 - 2 tablespoons chili sauce.
- Mix ingredients in wide mouthed bottle. Cork tightly and shake 2 minutes. Chill. When ready to serve shake well and serve on head lettuce or vegetable salads.
- This dressing will keep indefinitely if stored in cold place.

- 6 apples.
 - 1 1-2 cups water.
 - 1 cup sugar.

- 2 tablespoons flour.
 - 1-4 teaspoon salt.
 - 1-4 teaspoon cloves.
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon.
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla.
 - 2 tablespoons butter.
- Wash, core and peel the apples. Cover with water and cook in covered pan 10 minutes. Mix flour and sugar and mix with water in which the apples have been cooked. Boil 1 minute. Place cooked apples in bottom of deep buttered baking

Also Important to Choose Food That Will Exercise Gums

Cooked vegetables such as turnips, string beans, carrots, spinach and peas are also more palatable when flavored with sugar. A dash of sugar to a pinch of salt is a good rule.
