OPENING TODAY

Pendleton and Dallas Play
This Afternoon — Two
Portland Teams Meet.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 19 (AP)—With 26 boys, champion basketball players from all parts of the state, comprising 12 teams, in Salem ready for the first whistle which will send two five into the first of the 20 games which will be played here during the remainder of the week, everything was in readiness for the four-day grind which will end next Saturday night in one of the dozen teams being acclaimed champions for 1930.

When Ralph Coleman, veteran arbiter of cage games, blows a blast on his whistle at 2:30 this afternoon, ten players, five from Pendleton and five from Eugene, will set in motion a whirlwind of activity which will not be diminished until the final gun sounds Saturday night.

Pendleton Plays Today
The second game scheduled for this afternoon will be played between Pendleton and Dallas, while the first contest of the evening will find two Portland teams, Commerce and Lincoln, pitted against each other. North Bend and Tillamook will meet in the final game of the day.

Thursday morning at 9:50 o'clock the teams in today's battle will start the consolation series which will run space with the championship fight throughout the week.

Ashland and Astoria, more fortunate in their drawings than the teams which drew Wednesday's games, will meet Thursday morning with the Fishermen's favorites, by reason of their season's performance.

Portland Teams Matched
While season ticket sale on the 16th annual classic has not been up to last year's mark, demand for seats for single games has virtually taken up the slack. Willamette university's gymnasium is expected to be filled to capacity tonight on the result of the Portland teams being matched against each other.

Visiting players, with their coaches, were gathered together in one group this forenoon for the official photograph. Following this they were guests of the Salem Rotarians at a luncheon served at the Marion hotel.

Rev. Koenig, Willamette coach, and Leslie Sparks, graduate manager of the local university, report all arrangements complete for a successful tournament.

Coleman, of Oregon state, and Al French, of Portland, will referee during the tourney.

From England comes a reflection of the gubernatorial campaign in Oregon, for Colonel John Leader has written a letter replying to the reference to Henry L. Corbett as "High-Hat Harry." Colonel Leader was a British army officer who was sent to Oregon during the latter part of the war and was in charge of the officers' training camp at Eugene. He was known as a two-fisted fighting man and became immensely popular during his sojourn in this state.

Colonel Leader writes from 2, Whitehall Place, London, S. W., a Portland friend as follows:

"The winds of chance recently waited to me the good fortune of an Oregon paper, which, however, contained an otherwise clever article referring contemptuously to H. L. Corbett as 'High-Hat Harry.'"

"I have not heard from Mr. Corbett for years, and probably I have faded from his memory, but he served under me in the Oregon officers' training camp, the last year of the war. I think that if the most capable writer of the article referred to had seen him he would have altered the tone of his article. When the black death—the terrible influenza epidemic—struck us we had over 100 men stricken together, no nurses, and little accommodation. Corbett sat up every night nursing the sick, and it is my absolute belief that he saved at least a score of lives. By day he did his ten hours hard soldiering, and was always the first to volunteer for the most unpopular fatigues."

"I doubt if there were many greater instances of devotion to duty by any other soldier in any country in the war."

"My name will convey nothing to Oregonians now, except, perhaps a few soldiers' tales, but they will know that I do not make wild statements. My life has been spent on the outposts, at the uttermost ends of the earth, where one does not often meet soft living, but I have had no experience of a more unpretentious man, nor a truer man, nor a bigger man than H. L. Corbett of Portland, Ore."

Best Grade Of
Butter Remains
Scarce And Firm

PORTLAND, Mar. 19 (AP)—Scarcity of the best grade butter was still noticeable in today's market with relatively prices unusually firm.

Egg values were unchanged. Demand was still below the supply, but surplus receipts were going into storage.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Unfavorable weather conditions at southern producing districts in resulting in lighter shipments of most fruits and vegetables; and as a consequence, the Portland market is in a very healthy condition, with no undue accumulations of stocks, and the market tone generally firm."
