Butter Prices Steady, Firm; Flour Reduced

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 20 (AP)—Butter prices were unchanged and firm today. Egg values also looked firm, but quotations were undisturbed.

The Sperry Flour company has reduced the price of bakers' flour 20c a barrel and made reductions in all classes of mill and feedstuffs.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"The wholesale fruit and vegetable market was generally strong with a few price advances, and no recessions. Cauliflower advanced in price, to \$1.35 per crate. Roseburg 'flower' sells at the same price as California stock, although the latter is generally considered more desirable, on account of its greater uniformity.

"The lettuce market is firm at \$3.00 to \$3.25 per crate to retailers. An abundance of truck holdings, many of which show advanced maturity, is keeping the lettuce market from advancing more rapidly. Lettuce is selling at Imperial valley points today at about the same price as at Portland. With a freight rate of about \$1.00 per crate, higher priced lettuce is indicated, next week. Lettuce shipments from the Imperial valley declined from 265 cars daily, last

week, to about 100 cars daily, now. "The demand for apples continues to emphasize cheap, ungraded sorts—which are becoming increasingly difficult to obtain. Movement of graded classes is only moderate, at unchanged prices. Several hundred boxes of apples were loaded for export to Honolulu this week, in addition to the customary European forwardings.

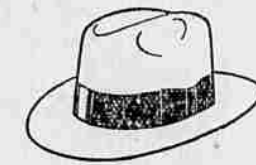

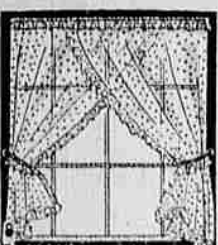

OBSERVERS SEE ECONOMIC PACT

"United States of Europe"
Exists — A. P. Writer
Explains Situation.

PARIS (AP)—A "United States of Europe" is already an economic fact.

That's what you hear in Paris both among French and European visitors close to currents shaping Europe's future.

International cartels in steel and potash are pointed to as indicating that the European confederation has been actually born.

"The infant is not husky, true, but leaders in finance and industry insist that the new organism possesses considerable nervous energy, and, destined to be constantly fed on the necessities of European economic reconstruction.

Never, perhaps, will a "United States of Europe" have a formal constitution, but it is seen eventually a mighty force in world economics.

Information available at Paris indicates that apprehensions concerning the future of Europe are not exclusively economic. They are clearly political also.

Many contend that statesmen should concentrate less on schemes for prevention of war and more on economic agreements. They argue that an economic cataclysm in any one great country will temporarily

have dangerous repercussions in other nations.

Although little or nothing appears in the press it is known that meetings between representative Frenchmen and representative Germans are taking place more often in a quiet effort to develop what is called the "rapprochement" between France and Germany.

The idea behind this movement is the belief that in the long run the interests of France and Germany in the dominion of economics and broad social questions are very largely identical.

WOMAN'S RULES TO GUIDE POLICE OF LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Rules laid down by a woman, Miss Mabel Olin, soon will be the law under which the Los Angeles police department will work.

She has compiled a new police manual, which is the culmination of her 15 years "on the force" as assistant secretary to a succession of police chiefs.

Miss Olin's manual is the result of her close observation of the inner workings of the department with rules compiled a score of years ago. Her name is on the book as author.

The sixty-page manual sets the police force in motion along the lines of a military organization. The outstanding change is the centralization of power, making each officer responsible for results. Reduction of the number of lieutenant concentrates this responsibility.

The exhibit includes pictures of historical homes and gardens of Fredericksburg, Palmyra and other Virginia towns. Miss Johnston is a pioneer photographer. Of late she has devoted most of her time to photographing interesting old gardens.

OLD RAILROADER DIES

Hevey, reputed to have been the oldest railroad man in the United States, who began his career as a train boy on a wood-burner in 1851, died last night at the age of 81. For 78 continuous years he was on the active payroll of various roads, during a period which witnessed the development of the "iron horse."

In 1868 he assisted in bringing soldiers and supplies to and from the battlefields of the Civil war.
