PUBLIC IS BILLIONS IN DEBT—SAYS RETAIL CREDIT GROUP NEW YORK (AP)—The American public is always \$15,000,000,000 in debt for purchases of retail goods. The National Retail Credit association estimates that retail merchants are about 70 days behind sales in their collections. The association has undertaken a campaign to reduce this period to 40 or 50 days and thereby release a good fraction of the 15 billion into commercial credit channels.
