By Alan Gould (Associated Press Sports Editor) PHOENIX, Feb. 21 (AP)—The glories of the old Red Sox have departed but the spirit carries gallantly on. When Connie Mack, in 1922, gave up his long-term occupancy of the American league cellar for better things, the Red Sox took over the home. With the exception of one season in the past eight, the Boston club has finished last a far cry from the halcyon days of 1902 to 1918 during which the Sox won 11 pennants and were seldom out of the first division.

1918 during which the Sox won 11 pennants and were seldom out of the first division. Red Sox manager Heine Wagner and manager of two world's championship teams, failed in a three-year comeback attempt to lift the Red Sox from their lowly estate. This year, Charles (Heine) Wagner, Carrigan's lieutenant and himself, a veteran of the famous 1912 championship, has taken over the somewhat thankless job of trying to go somewhere with a team that lacks the punch to be considered a serious factor in the race. Red Sox Have Spirit Nevertheless, the Red Sox have spirit and a number of promising factors in player talent. Unable to compete financially with a number of their rivals, they have stuck to the task of rebuilding slowly. Their determination was manifest early in the year when President Ed Quinn and Manager Wagner stoutly refused to listen to flattery offers of players and money needed cash from the Yankees for the services of the No. 1 right hander of the pitching staff, big Ed Morris of Mobile, Ala. With a bad place club in 1929, Morris was let and Joe M. Heine should do as well or better this year. In addition, Wagner counts on some capable right-handed hitters from Charley Ruffing, Dan MacPhayen, the former Somerville schoolboy star, Jack Russell and Bill Gaston. Almost Star Staff With any other outfit, this group might be considered a star staff. It lacks something in left-handed support, with only the veteran Billy Hayes, Edgar Carroll and Ed Durbin, the latter up from Pittsfield, as possible entries, unless Ben Shibe, formerly with the Yankees since a come-back, Ray Dohens, ex-college star, and Horace Lisenbee, once a sensation with Washington, have chances to stick. The pitching staff's lineup is marked by two useful outfielders, Jack Rothrock and Russ Scarth, who made good last year in his first major league season. Both are good hitters but their batting is not sufficient to offset the disadvantages of an infield which is good defensively but weakly weak at the bat. Tom Oliver, an Alabama product, may get the other outfield spot, although John Winsett, a 246 hitter with Mobile last year, 18-year-old Joe Cicero from the Eastern league, and Bill Barrett, formerly of the White Sox, are battling for jobs.

Fast Infield The regular infield shapes up as fast and snappy with Phil Todd at first, Regan at second, Hal Thyme at short and Bob Reeves, the former Georgia Tech star obtained from Washington, at third. Bill Stoney, who did some good stickwork with Toronto last year, will give Todd a battle before the first spring lineup is decided. Bill Narlosky, Ernest Holman and Otis Miller also are candidates for infield jobs, where hitting ability will have considerable to do with Wagner's final choice, since Carrigan's emphasis on defensive skill has to be met. The new manager just got a higher value on offensive power. Behind the bat, the veteran, Charley Etry, a former Lafayette all-American end, and John Hewlin, have the call. One youngster, Hal Ashburnson, who is only 20 and hit .250 with Pittsfield last year, seems sure to stick. Another, Ed Connolly, also from Pittsfield, will get a thorough trial.

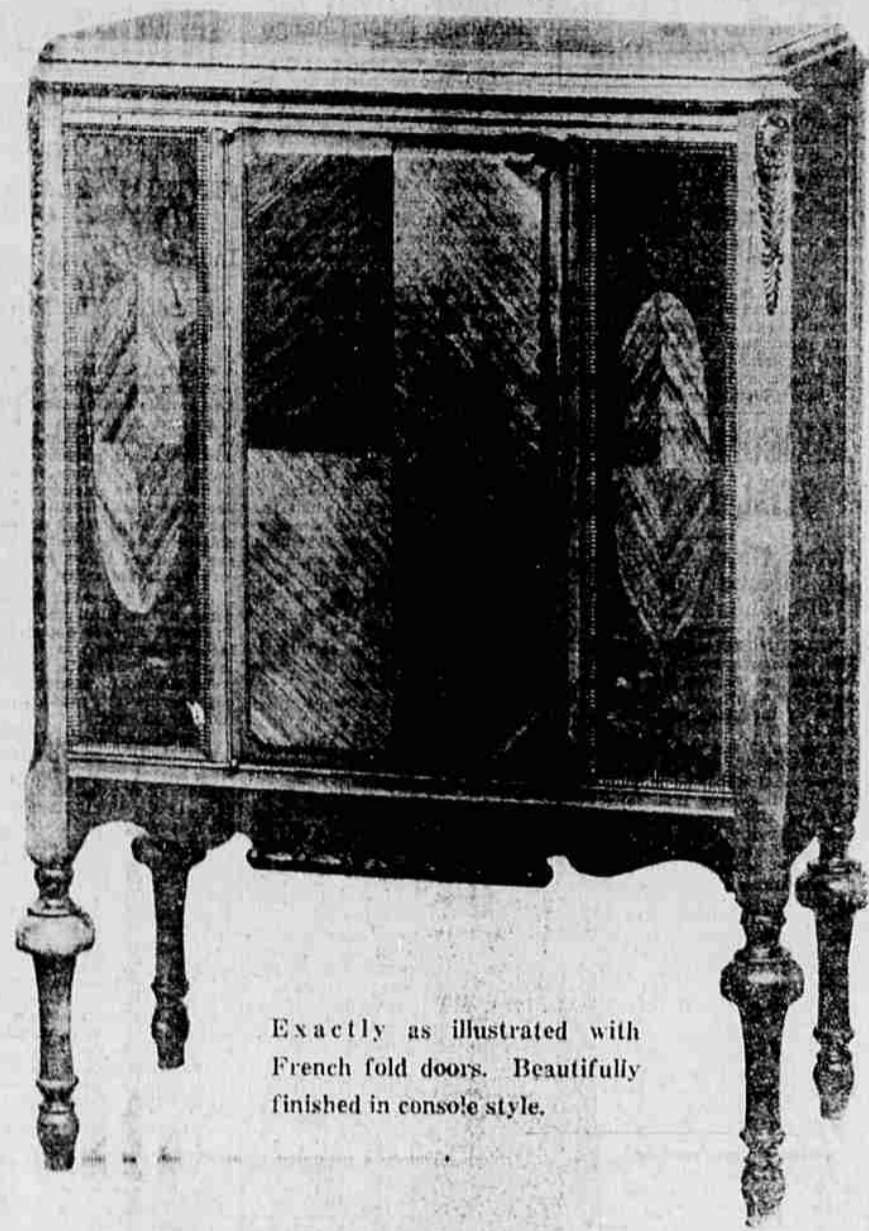

Road what Mike Fisher, one of the veterans, has to say: "My old Tacoma team that won the pennant in 1904, would just off the present coast league teams like nobody's business. "Fisher had the following players on his payroll: pitchers, Orvie Overall, Boby Keeve, Harry Wolf, Bill Tomes, Elmer Strick, left fielder, Ed Vrate, John Fitzgerald, catcher, Hal Moran, Charlie Grubman, first base, Lou Noddyke, second base, Pearl Casey, shortstop, Truck Egan, third base, Tommy Sheehan, outfielders.

George Hildebrand, Mike Lynch, Charley Doyle, George McLaughlin. Three of these players, Overall, Sheehan and Grubman, were drafted to the big leagues for \$750 each. Today the draft price is \$2000. Fisher sold Keeve and Walters to the New York Yankees for \$1000 each and got \$1200 for Noddyke from the Boston Americans.
