Russian Salad, Serving Six
 1 cup cooked peas, 1 cup dried, cooked beans, 1/2 cup cooked, dried carrots, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1/2 cup salt, 1/2 cup salad dressing.
 Mix and chill the ingredients and serve on lettuce.

Strawberry Shortcake, Serving Six
 2 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 table-spoon sugar, 1 tablespoon lard, 2 1/2 cup milk, 3 tablespoons soft butter, 3 cups berries, 2-3 cups sugar.
 Mix the flour, baking powder, salt and 1 tablespoon of sugar, cut in the fat with a knife and mixing with the knife add the milk. When a soft dough forms, pat it out on a floured paper until the dough is 1 inch thick. Shape into a cake and place on a greased baking pan. Bake for 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Split and spread with part of the butter. Add some of the berries which have been mixed with the 2-3 cup

of sugar. Replace the top part of the shortcake and spread with the rest of the butter and top with the remaining butter mixture. Serve fresh with plain or whipped cream.

Tuna Salad, Serving Eight
 1 1/2 cups dried tuna, 1 1/2 cups diced celery, 3 hard cooked eggs, diced, 1/2 cup chopped sweet pickle, 1/2 cup chopped pimento stuffed olives, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cup salad dressing.
 Mix the ingredients. Chill and serve on lettuce leaves. If a more salad is desired, more dressing can be added to the salad after it has been arranged on the lettuce.
