Vegetable And Fruit Markets Stronger Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 21 (AP) - Eggs and butter prices were without change today.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"The fresh fruit and vegetable market showed strength in most lines. Asparagus supplies were very light, but prices were not advanced, in view of anticipated heavier arrivals later in the week.

"Cauliflower supplies are light, especially Oregon stock. Harvesting at Roseburg is limited, and the occasional carlot requirements are taking nearly all offerings. Winter freezing injury is apparently more serious at that district than was originally estimated; and total production may not exceed 50 or 60 cars. Much stock is failing to attain marketable size.

"The onion market is almost demoralized; demand is very slow at all terminal points; and Oregon growers are now receiving 50 to 60¢ per cwt. plus sacks.

"The lettuce market is firm, for good fresh stock; some over-mature offerings are druggery, however."
