EXCHANGE PRESIDENT RESIGNS
SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 22 (AP)—George N. Keystone, president of the San Francisco stock exchange, tendered his resignation to the board of governors this morning. The resignation followed the recent indictment of Keystone together with several members of his brokerage firm on charges of aiding the alleged embezzlement of around \$500,000 from a branch of the Bank of Italy. Few persons would keep their present jobs if they felt heir to \$1,000,000, tests by Dr. Harry D. Kluon, Columbia university psychologist, revealed.
