To keep his 4000 chickens healthy and increase egg production, Bernard Bernstein of Ellyria, Ohio, has established a chicken "hospital" or clinic on his Rosemead Farms. Under the direction of Sanford Meek, the hens are bathed and examined before they enter the flock. If diseased, they are placed under treatment by Meek and not released until pronounced cured. Wheat Two Cents
Lower at Close

CHICAGO, Mar. 22 (AP)—Influenced in some degree by relief expressed in various quarters that reactions would be natural after a recent sharp upturn, wheat developed a downward trend today. Winnipeg price declines were a bearish factor during the late dealings, with notice being taken of heavy snowfalls in Canadian wheat territory where moisture has been deficient. Complaints of dryness in the American southwest were virtually ignored.

Wheat closed heavy, 1 1/2 @ 1 1/4 a bushel lower than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/2 @ 1 1/2 down, oats 1/4 @ 1/2 and provisions varying from 2c decline to 5c advance.
