The meeting will begin about 8 o'clock and lunch will be served after the program. Word has already been received from Summerville to expect about 25 from those two lodges and Elgin, La Grande and Cove will also be represented. Sunday morning the local Meth-

odist pastor went to La Grande to fill the pulpit there at the regular preaching hour in La Grande Methodist church. At the same time the Rev. Ira Aldrich had charge of the services in Union. The plumbing shop connected with the local hardware store, is being partitioned off with the shop in the rear part of the room and the front papered and fixed up as a show room and office. George Foster, who has been making his home at Hot Lake for several months where his wife is in the hospital, has returned to Union and will again make this place his home. Bills are out announcing the presentation of a three-act comedy play "Uncle Ben's Money" by a cast from the junior class of the Union high school at the school gym Friday evening Mar. 28. The cast includes: Barton Conner, Weldon Weaver, Ronald Crossland, Reynolds Baxter, Glasa Vaden, Aileen Boyles, Dora Crouter, Norrine Kofford and Oreta Baum. The juniors staged a play earlier in the year and are giving this special program to add to their fund for the annual junior-senior banquet. Friday evening in the Knights of Pythias hall a team from Eureka Odd Fellows lodge of Pendleton was here and gave four candidates the first degree. They brought their own equipment and also their four-piece orchestra to furnish music for the floor work. This team is probably the best in Eastern Oregon, having won a cup in a contest with a Portland team competing in the first degrees. About thirty Buckaroos made the trip to Union two of them being Past Grand Master Alexander and Past Grand Master Bowman. The former joined the order in La Grande in 1872 and the following year moved to Union and was one of five charter members of Union lodge No. 43. He is the only surviving charter member of the local lodge which was organized 57 years ago.
