

## 4 PERMITS TAKEN OUT DURING WEEK

Building Total for 1930 Reaches \$187,755—One New Home is Planned

During the last week four building permits were taken out at the city office, three of them for alterations and repairs and the other for a new building. The total estimated cost of the four jobs is \$22,000, which brings the running total of building in La Grande for 1930 to \$187,755.

On Mar. 19 a permit was issued to G. W. Vetter to erect a one-story building to be used as a dwelling place. It will be on N avenue between Willow and Cherry and the estimated cost is \$1000.

The other three permits follow: Mar. 17—James Schilling, to alter and repair a one-story frame dwelling on A between Birch and Depot work to cost \$1000.

Mar. 18—A. J. H. to alter and repair a building on Spruce third between W and N work to cost \$200.

Mar. 20—Oscar Johnson, to alter and repair a building on Spruce avenue between Second and Fourth streets work to cost \$1000.

Mr. H. Bonney and Warren Corry left Wednesday for the Imogene river to fish the steelheads.

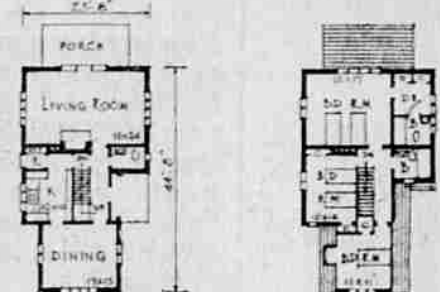

## HOUSE FOR A NARROW LOT

This narrow lot house is particularly adapted for its design. It is well with closely spaced surroundings.

However, the house goes well either on a good-sized lot or a narrow strip. It built along the lot should be about 30 feet wide, but a 40-foot frontage will accommodate it either way.

Exceptional lighting arrangements are offered by this plan providing for a dining room and living room each of which has windows on three sides.

A distinct appearance is achieved with the low roof line as well as the unique entrance design.

Red brick is used for the exterior, although the builder may attain a different effect by whitewashing it if he so desires.

The upstairs hallway leads to three bedrooms, two baths and an extra dressing room. There have been economically fitted into the available space, in addition to several closets.

Convenient hallways are a feature of the downstairs. The large living room leads to a side or rear porch.

On the basis of average wage and material costs in various sections of the country, it is estimated this house could be built for \$8,000 or \$10,000. The exact figure naturally will be determined by choice of material in different communities, as well as labor costs.

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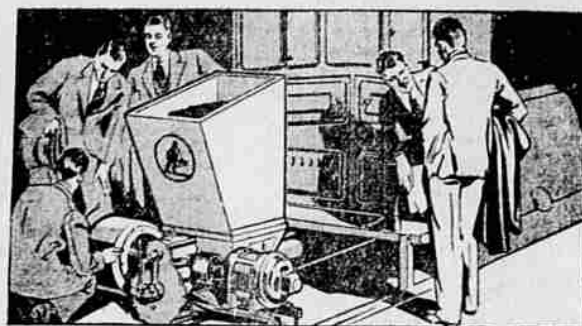
