"Apple Mary" Dies Almost Unnoticed

CHICAGO (AP)—"Apple Mary," the newspaperman's friend, is dead.

The passing of a figure familiar to Chicago newspapermen for 59 years almost went unnoticed. It was an old printer on one of Chicago's dailies who recognized in the obituary column he was set-

ting up the name of Mrs. Mary L. Ames.

There were not many who knew that name but all of the earlier day journalists knew "Apple Mary." Carrying a basket of fruit and candy she visited the newspaper offices every day and every night. When one of her "boys" was sick

or broke, "Apple Mary" helped him out.

The subject of many feature stories and mentioned in several short stories and novels, "Apple Mary" became almost a legendary character. Among the men she knew who achieved fame later were Eugene Field, Victor E. Law-

son, Carter Harrison, George Ade and Finley Peter Dunne.

Once, years ago, Mary had the gripe and did not appear for two days. She was surprised to find reporters flocking to her home and writing of her illness as she had seen them write of the ailments of society leaders.
