Superintendent Will Preach At Church Sunday

Dr. Harry S. Hamilton, of Boise, Ida., will deliver the sermon during the morning worship hour at the First M. E. church Sunday, beginning at 11 o'clock. Dr. Hamilton, who is district superintendent, will speak on the subject "Your Family Tree."

The morning worship hour follows Bible school at 9:45 a. m. with E. A. Burnett as superintendent. Epworth League meets at 6:30 p. m. followed by the Study class.

First Church of Christ, Scientist. Services are held Sunday at 11 a. m. and 3 p. m. at First Church of Christ, Scientist at First and Washington streets.

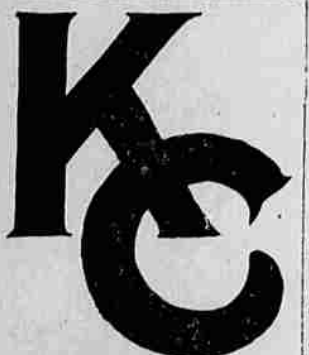

LIGHT TEMPLES FOR CENTENNIAL



One feature of the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the formation of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, beginning April 6 at Salt Lake City, will be the illumination of flood lights of the seven temples of the church, every night. Four of the temples are shown here: that at Salt Lake, upper left; at Mesa, Arizona, upper right; at Laie, Hawaii, lower left; at Mantu, Utah, lower right. In the center is shown the font in the Salt Lake temple where living persons are baptized in behalf of their dead relatives. The sculptured figure in the upper center, stands on the high-tower of the Salt Lake temple, and represents the angel, who, it is claimed, gave the "Mormons" their Book of Mormon.

THE GARDEN

The combination vegetable and flower garden is becoming an innovation of increasing popularity. The most practical application of it is on small places where garden space is limited. The garden space is used for the earliest vegetables which are replaced when they are used by flowers. The method is to plant alternate rows of vegetables and flowering annuals. Many of the annuals desired cannot be sown as early as the vegetables, the zinnia being a case in point. Sow a row of zinnias between the rows of radishes and lettuce. The zinnias should not be sown until two weeks after the seeds of the earliest vegetable crop to go in. By the time the vegetables have been pulled the zinnias will be getting into their stride and by midsummer they will have filled the space where the radishes and lettuce grew.

Rows of gladiolus bulbs may be planted in the same manner. It is a simple matter to alternate rows of annuals and vegetables so that the vegetable garden of spring automatically transforms itself into the flower garden of midsummer merely by pulling the vegetables to use as they mature. Verbenas, petunias, poppies, California poppies, in fact all of the common annuals, may be grown in this way, the vegetable garden becoming a cutting garden to furnish bouquets for the house.

Another and even more practical method is to start seeds of the annuals in boxes and they can then be transplanted into position as the vegetables are removed. Another combination system is that of using the rows of vegetables as a temporary border for the flower garden, their removal making way for later planted bulbs or flowering plants.

Such a combination garden needs careful planning in order to provide room to cultivate the vegetables and annuals in their early stages of growth. A row of zin-

nias should have at least six inches on either side for the smaller growing vegetables such as radishes and onion sets or spinach.

Christian Science Building Planned

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., (Special)—Under articles of incorporation already filed with the secretary of state, permanent trustees took over on Mar. 25 the ownership of the property and buildings which are to accommodate the Christian Science Benevolent association for the Pacific coast.

This association is the third large charitable institution established by the Mother Church, totaling an investment of over \$4,000,000. The California property, known as Arden Wood, is a thickly timbered, 15-acre piece of rolling land on the edge of San Francisco and the sanatorium is sheltered from the prevailing winds by the hill which forms the principal topographical feature of the property. The sanatorium is of steel and reinforced concrete done in a modernized Breton style and will contain accommodations for 120 guests and associates.

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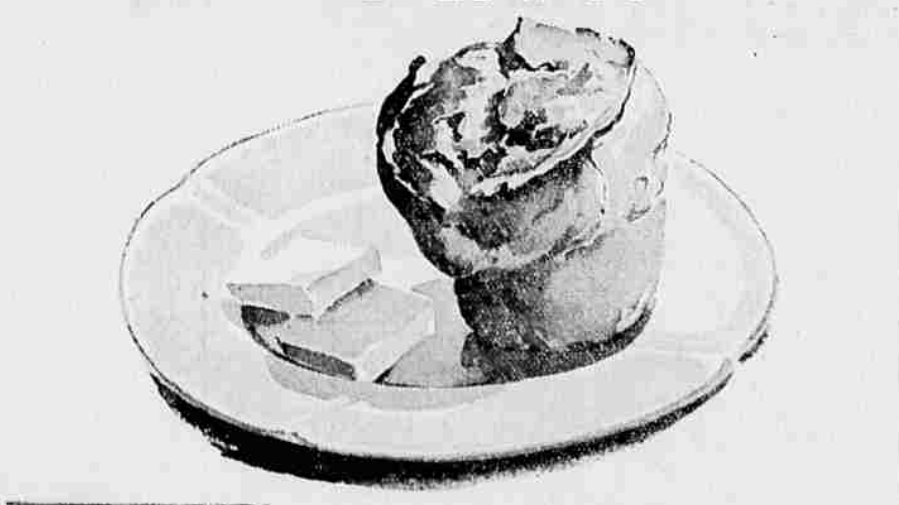
