"The health of the child is principally dependent upon the mother," Miss Alice H. Marquardt, county health nurse, said in her address to the parent-teacher association of the Ackerman Training school at its meeting last night in the normal school.

"And upon this responsibility is founded the welfare of the nation," she continued. "The old idea that children may as well have the so-called 'children's diseases' while young and get them over with has not been entirely eradicated. One of the largest expenses of the school system is its 'repeaters' and many of these could be eliminated by prearranged attention."

She also announced a pre-school clinic for children who will enter school near year, to be held May 1, national children's health day.

Withered Indian Woman Tells Of Killing "Witch"

BUFFALO, March 27 (AP) — Nancy Bowen, the withered old Cayuga Indian, yesterday told a jury she had killed the "white witch of Buffalo," Mrs. Henry Marchand, on instructions from Lila Jimeron, the Seneca woman on trial for the murder of the artist's wife.

In a high pitched, almost whining Indian tongue, Nancy told through an Indian interpreter the developments of the Marchand murder beginning on February 27 and carrying through the actual slaying.

She described in detail how she battered the head of the little French woman with three blows of a ten-cent hammer and then, to stifle Mrs. Marchand's screams for her police dog, choked her into insensibility and death with a wad of chloroformed paper crammed into the throat.
