Slight Gain For "Repeal" In Third Week's Count of Prohibition Poll

Kansas is the only state that is voting "home dry" in the Literary Digest's nation-wide poll on prohibition, according to the third week's tabulation of over a million votes which will appear in Saturday's issue of the periodical.

Of the 1,244,483 postcard ballots returned, 527,388, or over 42 per cent of the total, vote for repeal of the prohibition amendment, 233,117 favor modification to permit light wines and beers, while nearly 27 per cent of those voting to date, 333,978, urge the strict enforcement of the eighteenth amendment and Volstead law.

The returns evidence a slight gain in the ratio of those favoring repeal.

Of the twenty states whose returns are listed in the current tabulations, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota and Washington show more votes in favor of enforcement than for either modification or repeal.

In Missouri, a strong dry vote runs considerably ahead of that for modification, but the "Show Me" vote for repeal is greater than for either enforcement or modification.

The other ten states, California, Connecticut, Illinois, Minnesota, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, and also the District of Columbia, give a vote for repeal greater than for either modification or enforcement.

Georgia, the only southern state from which ballots have been tabulated, shows 4,951 votes for enforcement out of a total of 19,855 counted.

Butter And Eggs Unchanged Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 28 (AP)—Butter and egg prices remained unchanged today, but there was a slight weakness in butter which many took to indicate that the recent advance might not hold.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Asparagus supplies are liberal, demand is improving, and prices are lower again at 10c per lb. for best green asparagus. Increased consumption of asparagus is probably affecting demand for other fresh vegetables. Cauliflower is moving slowly, with sales to Portland jobbers as low as \$1.15 per bushel. The market for cauliflower is rather slow, but movement to retailers is rather slow at unchanged prices. Many of the city's current unloads are going into storage."

"Cabbage weakened in response to lower shipping-point prices, but is still a luxury at 8c per lb."

"Potatoes continue firm at all northern shipping districts, and carlot sales at Yakima were a shade higher. The Portland jobbing market is firm, but movement to retailers is rather slow at unchanged prices. Many of the city's current unloads are going into storage."

Wheat Strong And Higher at Close

CHICAGO, Mar. 28 (AP)—Increasingly pessimistic reports concerning the crop outlook south-west took wheat to sharply higher price levels in the late dealings today. Forecasts pointed to continuance of drought in domestic hard winter wheat territory, and there were also dry weather complaints from Roumania, one of the largest of the Danubian exporting countries. Furthermore, damage to soft winter wheat was reported in Illinois, Indiana and Ohio, although heavy snowfalls should prove beneficial.

Wheat closed strong 1 1/2 @ 1/2 a bushel higher than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 3/8 @ 1/2c up, oats unchanged to 1/2c advance, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 7c.

Stock Market In 1930 Record Day

NEW YORK, Mar. 28 (AP)—All 1930 trading records on the New York stock exchange were broken today with another turnover of more than 5,000,000 shares in a session featured by the activity and strength of the railroad and public utility shares and the weakness of the banking and merchandise issues.
