CHAMBER BRINGS 751 FAMILIES TO OREGON IN YEAR

PORTLAND, Mar. 28. (AP)—The need for more settlers in Oregon to spread the taxation burden was stressed by L. S. Hamilton of Bend, president of the Oregon chamber of commerce, at the eleventh annual meeting of the chamber here. He complimented the chamber upon this work during the past year. W. G. Ide, state manager, had reported that 751 families had been induced to come to the state by the chamber's land settlement work. Only 45 families came to Oregon in 1928.

W. S. Kirkpatrick, promotion man for the state chamber, said results from the national advertising campaign being carried on by the chamber of commerce are shown by the fact that although but \$5000 of the \$25,000 allotted by the state legislature had been spent to date, the chamber has received letters from 700 interested farmers in other states. He said 800 of these families have definitely decided to come to Oregon. Kirkpatrick estimated that settlers would bring to Oregon \$2,500,000 in capital in 1929.

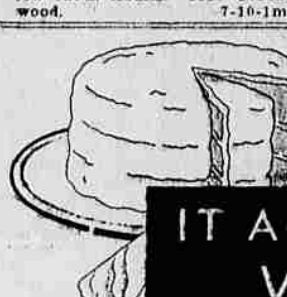
