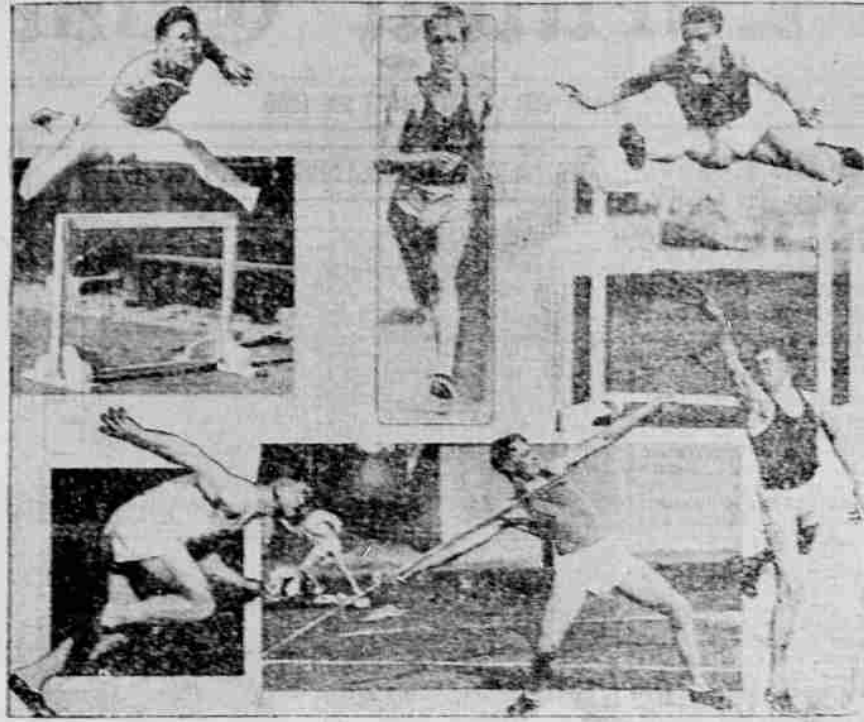

Though the result of the contest surprised many, it was not surprising to those who knew McLarnin's power. In the end, McLarnin's victory could be attributed not to the crushing power of his punches, but to the superior ring generalship and boxing skill as well as his courage. Not once did Jimmy show signs of being overpowered by the Irishman who had knocked out such contenders as Joe Gluck, the light-weight, and Sammy Baker and Harry Goldstein, who were world champions of the light-weight division. Thompson was a very good fighter, but he was not a boxer. McLarnin's victory was a surprise to many who knew that McLarnin's power was his main feature.
