RELAPSE By Alice Johnson Peale There is, probably, nothing more distressing to the conscientious mother than to see the child which she has so carefully trained relapse into bad habits which, she thought, had been definitely outgrown. Menus Of The Day

By Mrs. Alexander George PINEAPPLE PUDDING FOR DINNER Creamed Mushrooms Mashed Potatoes Buttered Beets Bread Plum Jelly Vegetable Salad in Gelatin Pineapple Pudding and Sauce Coffee Creamed Mushrooms (Serving 4) 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, 2 cups water, 3 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, 1/2 cup cooked dried celery, 1 1/2 cups milk.

Carefully scrape the mushrooms, cut the tops and stems in dice. Cover with the water and cook gently for 15 minutes. Drain and reserve one-half cup of the stock. Melt the butter and add the flour, salt, paprika and celery salt. Add the celery, mushroom stock and milk. Cook until a creamy sauce forms. Stir frequently to prevent scorching and lumping. Add the mushrooms and cook for two minutes. Serve on hot buttered toast. Leftover cooked meat or fish can be added to creamed mushrooms and fresh peas blend well. Vegetable Salad in Gelatin 1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 4 teaspoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cup chopped cabbage, 1/2 cup chopped carrots, 1/2 cup chopped green peppers. Pour the water over the gelatin mixture and stir until it has dissolved. Add the lemon juice, sugar and salt. Cook. Add the rest of the ingredients. Pour into a shallow pan which has been fitted with waxed paper. Bake for 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Sauce Cream the fat and sugar. Add the rest of the ingredients and beat for two minutes. Pour into a shallow pan which has been fitted with waxed paper. Bake for 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Blend sugar and flour. Add rest of ingredients and cook for 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Serve warm on pudding.
