Mrs. L. Pans, public welfare chairman, held a check up conference.

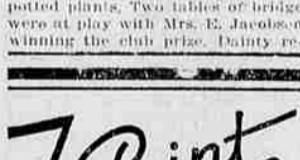
Monday Dinner Club Entertained

A LENTEN DINNER MENU
(Meatless)

Escalloped Eggs and Cheese
Baked Potatoes
Buttered Green Beans
Corn Muffins
Cabbage Gelatin Salad
Gloried Rice

Escalloped Eggs and Cheese, Serving 6
6 hard cooked eggs, sliced.
4 tablespoons butter.
5 tablespoons flour.
2 1/2 cups milk.
1 teaspoon salt.
4 cup chopped celery.
1 teaspoon finely chopped onions.

Corn Muffins (Light and fluffy)
1 1/4 cups flour.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
1-5 teaspoon salt.
4 tablespoons sugar.
3/4 cup yellow corn meal.
1 egg.
1 cup milk.
2 tablespoons butter melted.
MIX the ingredients and beat for three minutes. Half fill greased muffin pans and bake for 15 min-

utes in a moderate oven. Serve warm.

Cabbage Gelatin Salad
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.
1 1/2 cups boiling water.
2 cups chopped cabbage.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1-3 cup salad dressing.
Pour the boiling water over the gelatin mixture and stir until it has dissolved. Cool. Fold in the rest of the ingredients and pour into a mold which has been rinsed

out with cold water. Set in a cold place to stiffen. Serve on lettuce.

Gloried Rice, Serving 8
2 cups boiled rice.
2-3 cup sugar.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1 teaspoon lemon extract.
2 cups chopped or grated canned pineapple.
1 cup diced marshmallows
1 cup whipped cream.

Mix the rice, sugar, salt, vanilla, lemon extract and pineapple. CHILL for one hour. Add the rest of the ingredients. Chill and serve in glass cups.
