If mother was always too busy and father too bored to answer his questions the child may not only give up the habit of asking questions but he may lose the urge in which they had their origin. simply a duller and less interested child. On the other hand it often happens that parents, realizing the importance of encouraging their child's curiosity, succeed only in killing it with kindness. They conscientiously try to answer literally and in full every question he asks. He asks what makes the sun set and receives not the short and simplified explanation which is suitable to his years but a lecture on the solar system. He wants to know where honey comes from and is told not simply that the bees gather it from the flowers but given as well an exhaustive account of the life of the bee. A child's curiosity may not only die of discouragement it may be asphyxiated with facts. Answering a child's questions successfully consists not in answering them all nor in answering them literally but in telling him what it is he really wants to know and presenting to him this information as simply and as concretely as possible. The only thing which is even better than this is to help the child answer his own questions through his own observation and investigation.

Menus Of The Day

By Mrs. Alexander George ENTERTAINING AT DINNER Chilled Diced Fruit Stuffed Veal Steak Creamed New Potatoes Battered Asparagus on Toast Hot Rolls Currant Jelly Fresh Vegetable Salad Angel Food Biscuits Coffee

Stuffed Veal Steak, Serving 8 2 pounds veal steak cut 3/4 inch thick, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 5 tablespoons bacon fat, 2 tablespoons butter, 2-3 cup water. Wipe off the steak with a damp cloth, sprinkle with the salt and paprika. Place one slice in a baking pan, cover with the dressing and add the other slices. Dot with the bacon fat and butter. Add the water and a lid. Bake for one and a quarter hours in a moderate oven. Baste frequently. Carefully remove to a serving platter and garnish with parsley.

Fresh Vegetable Salad 4 tomatoes peeled and sliced, 1/2 cup sliced celery, 1/2 cup sliced radishes, 1/2 cup shredded green peppers, 2 tablespoons chopped onions, 1 cup French dressing. Mix and chill the ingredients. Serve on generous portions of crisp, chilled lettuce. Angel Food Biscuits 16 egg whites, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat the egg whites until stiff.

Beat in the cream of tartar and slowly beat in the sugar which has been sifted four times. Beat until the mixture is very creamy. Carefully fold in the flour and salt which have been sifted together five times. Add the vanilla. Pour into deep round angel food cake pan which has been lined with cold water. Bake for one hour in a very slow oven. Remove from the oven and invert. When cool, carefully remove from the pan. With forks and a sharp knife, tear out the inside of the cake, being careful to reserve a shell of sufficient thickness to hold the filling. Add the filling. Reserve the crumbs. Filling: Angel food cake crumbs, 1 cup dried pineapple, 1 cup candied cherries, 1 1/2 cups whipped cream, 1/2 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix and chill the cream, sugar and vanilla. Mix the rest of the ingredients and add one-half the whipped cream mixture. Refill the angel food cake shell. Spread the remaining cream mixture over the top. Chill for several hours. Serve sliced at the table.
