Yen Hsi-Shan In Command Of National Army

PEIPING, China, April 3 (AP) — Yen Hsi-Shan, governor of Shan-shai, yesterday assumed office at Tientsin as commander-in-chief of the "National" land, naval and air forces.

At the same time he issued a circular telegram to the people pledging his support to a move for the overthrow of Chiang Kai-Shek, president of the nationalist government, whom Yen denounced as a dictator.

Yen asserted that the Kuomintang, the nationalist political organization, had developed into the personal instrument of Chiang who does with it whatever pleases his fancy.

In response to requests from party supporters and also petitions from both the army and the people, said Yen, "I am determined to assume the office of commander-in-chief of the armed forces with the aim of leading various expeditions to save the Kuomintang and the nation."

Yen Hsi-Shan, in one of the most direct declarations he has ever issued, detailed charges against Chiang Kai-Shek accusing him of various political blunders. "While corruption and bribery are openly practiced," he said, "no one dares protest. Also, while bandits infest the land, the government remains indifferent. Indeed the party has ceased to be a party, the government has ceased to be a government, the nation has ceased to be a nation."

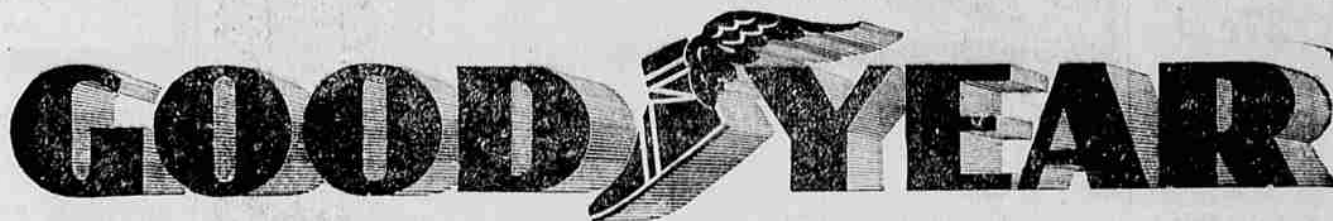
