Former Minister Dies In Vienna

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3 (AP)—Albert H. Washburn, former minister to Austria, who died last night in a Vienna hospital, was President Hoover's selection for the next ambassador to Japan.

The announcement was made at the White House today.

Mr. Washburn returned to Austria two weeks ago to close up the affairs of the embassy there. He planned to return to this country and then take up his duties in Tokyo as American ambassador.

William J. Casie Jr., long an assistant secretary of state, now holds the post in Japan as a special ambassador.
