Democrat Gain Makes Hoosier Politics Buzz

INDIANAPOLIS, (AP)—A seemingly certain democratic party victory in what otherwise might have been a tame primary election May 6 in Indiana.

With victories gained by democrats in a majority of city elections last November, the party has brought forward the strongest available candidates.

Republican leaders have urged harmony to carry through the May 6 election without party strife.

Interest centers around the contest for nominations for U. S. representatives, United States senator and governor candidates are not nominated this year. Nominations for state officers will be made at state conventions in June.

Just three democrats are in the Hoosier delegation of 13 in the house of representatives and to increase that representation the party is holding its efforts.

The democrats are out to recapture the third district, along with returning their candidates from the second and fourth.

Democrats expect to hold to the seventh district (Indianapolis and Marion county) where republican strife has created a rift. Louis Lullow, Indianapolis newspaperman, will be opposed for the democratic nomination to succeed himself as representative. The seventh district ordinarily is republican and former Mayor Charles W. Jewett and Arch H. Hall, attorney, probably will seek that party's nomination.

In the doubtful column are the first, fifth, and eleventh districts.

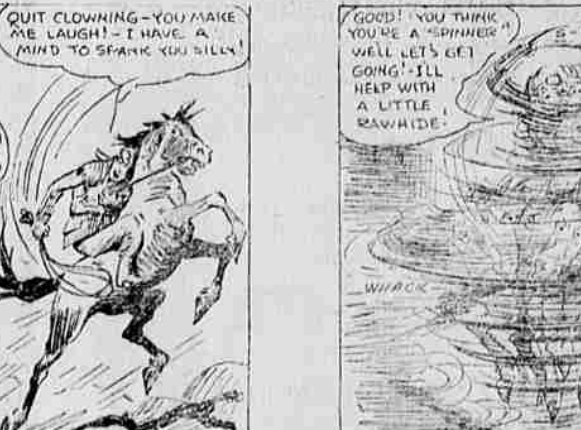
