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## STANFORD AXE RETURNED HOME

Stolen 31 Years Ago by California, Strategy Used to Win it Back.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Apr. 4 (AP)—The historic Cardinal axe, cause of intermittent warfare since 1859 when it was stolen from Stanford by a group of University of California students at a baseball game, is back on the Stanford campus again today.

Careful planning, strategy that would have done credit to a Caesar—added Stanford to recover the axe last night soon after it had been displayed at the annual California "axe rally" in the Greek theatre.

The rally over Norman L. Horn, Bear athlete and newly elected custodian of the coveted trophy, rode with a group of bodyguards to the Berkeley bank where the axe has been kept for more than a quarter of a century. Bank guards and a score of cars containing California adherents flanked the steel-sided truck.

As Horn stepped from the truck in front of the bank, a news reel cameraman, reporters and newspaper cameramen stopped up.

"Let's get a good picture," suggested the news reel man. "You held it out toward me and I'll make out as if I am going to grab it."

## Gagnon To Meet Tuffy Griffiths In Second Fight

CHICAGO, Apr. 4 (AP)—Sailor Jack Gagnon, French-Canadian heavyweight from Boston, stands to make himself around \$25,000 for meeting Jerry (Tuffy) Griffiths, of Sioux City, Ia., and Chicago, in the Chicago stadium April 20, all because Chicago fight fans refuse to believe his technical knockout of Tuffy at Philadelphia last Monday wasn't an accident.

Gagnon was not a high-priced attraction before his victory over Griffiths, but when Matchmaker Nate Lewis, of the stadium, tried to sign him up for a return match with Griffiths, the Boston puncher demanded a guarantee of \$25,000.

So eager to Jack O'Keefe, Griffiths' manager, for a return bout, that he has offered to buy Gagnon's 20 per cent offer for \$15,000 cash, and to keep what might remain—if anything—to reestablish the fight one as a ranking challenger for the title vacated by Gene Tunney.

The bout would be the windup of an all-heavyweight card for which Matchmaker Lewis had opened negotiations with Pauline Luciani, George Godfrey, Pierre Charles, Otto Von Porat, William Stebbins, Arthur De Kuhl, Al Kay, and Paul Panolice.

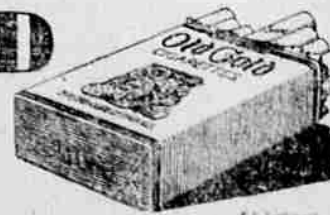
