Three Presidents In Radio Program

WASHINGTON, Apr. 4 (AP)—Presidents of three American countries were called upon Thursday to inaugurate a radio-telephone system of the International Telephone and Telegraph company which linked the North and South American continents in public telephone service.

The program included the exchange of greetings between President Hoover, President Carlos Ibáñez of Chile, and President Juan Castillo of Uruguay.

President Hipólito Yrigoyen, of Argentina, was scheduled to join but he called President Hoover to say he was unable to participate on account of a cold and sore throat.

TWO FILIPINOS SHOT DAVENPORT, Wash., Apr. 4 (AP)—Two Filipino laborers, Filadelfo Banzuelata and Julian Estradilla, were shot, both fatally, as they were eating dinner in a section camp dining hall near Iry low night. Marvin Guerra, 24, also a Filipino, who was held, said he shot them because they insulted him.

U. S. FARM IMPLEMENTS SENT TO 10 COUNTRIES WASHINGTON (AP)—Canada, Argentina and Russia lead all other countries in buying power farming machinery from the United States.

Of \$140,501,550 worth of farm implements exported last year, Canada accounted for \$17,144,754 worth. Argentina's total of \$23,242,051 and Russia's \$22,121,429.

Of all American-made farm machinery, 83 per cent was shipped to 19 foreign countries.

NO NEED FOR TASTELESS VEGETABLES

Their Flavor Can Be Improved While Cooking or Before Serving Them

Cooks who are successful in the art of making vegetables appealing, depend upon two rules. First, cook raw vegetables in as little water as possible. Canned vegetables should not be re-cooked—merely heat them thoroughly. Second, use a mixture of sugar and salt in seasoning them.

Salt, by itself, merely overcomes fatness. Sugar, however, "brings out" the flavor of the vegetable. And when the two are combined, an unusual appetizing goodness is developed. A dash of sugar to a pinch of salt is a good rule to follow.

In the case of extra-mild flavored vegetables, sugar, salt, mustard, oil, and vinegar can be combined and used as a flavor just before serving. For example, after spinach—canned or fresh—is taken from the fire, drain it and then heat for a minute in this mixture: 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon vinegar and 2 tablespoons salad oil.

The more one experiments with sugar and salt in seasoning vegetables, the more apparent is the flavor value of this combination. Doctors and dietitians approve this use of sugar as a flavor. Most foods are more delicious with sugar. The Sugar Institute.

Delicious refreshments were served later in the afternoon. Mrs. Arthur Huff and Mrs. Frank Anderson will be hostesses at the next meeting.

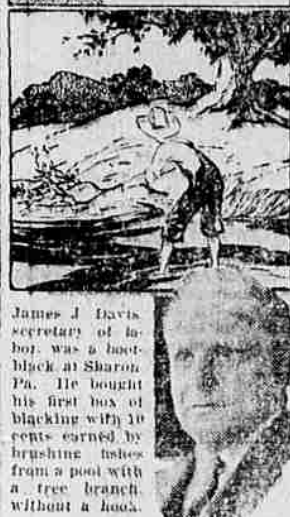
Auxiliary Dance Enjoyable Event

FLINT, Mich., Apr. 4 (AP)—For the next few weeks fire fighting is going to be only a minor hazard among Flint firemen. They have just found out that their pants are rapidly wearing out and there isn't any chance of getting new ones before the present trousers are pretty far gone.

A three alarm for pants relief was turned in to the city council last afternoon and they were tied up by the city charter and couldn't touch the 1929 budget, in which the pants are included, before July 1. The firemen say they have to have pants—293 pairs of them—long before July 1.

Afternoon George Boyson said the city would have to take its chances on having fires extinguished—at least in the day time—if the pants aren't forthcoming within a couple of weeks.

The council, which is in a predicament almost as serious as the firemen, has gone into a huddle over the affair.

THE BIGGEST MAYOR CLAYTON, N. M. (AP)—Clayton believes it has elected the biggest mayor in the United States. Its 12. Pennington was the overwhelming victor in the municipal election. Turkey to Censor Films CONSTANTINOPLE (AP)—Censorship of films is to be controlled henceforth by the Turkish national board of censors. Films imported will be censored, according to official statement, on the basis of their "scientific, social, hygienic, historic and national effects."
