Active Church Membership Is Listed At 383

A number of interesting facts about the Presbyterian church were given at the congregation meeting Wednesday evening in the church, a resume of the reports reveals.

The Sunday school including the cradle roll of 77 names and the Home department, now numbers 628 active members. The school is managed by 14 officers and 26 teachers. The average attendance in the sessions of the school during the year was 202. The beginners' department had an average attendance of 44, with an average offering of \$2.20, or a total of \$114.44. The primary department enjoyed an average attendance of 50, with a total offering for the year of \$186.16.

The Women's Missionary society with an enrolled membership of 58 raised an amount of \$460.25, while the Ladies Aid raised \$1129.46, and the Home department of the Sunday school raised \$78.15.

The present active church membership roll lists 383.

The Ladies' Yvian choir of 34 voices, Mrs. A. L. Richardson, director, and the Junior choir of 15 voices, E. E. Harley, director, functioned in the services of the church through the year.

Contact with the community in need manifested the spirit of generosity, when baskets of food, clothing and warm bed covers were distributed to the needy. Sport Slants

Last year, when the major league teams trotted out for their opening games after the band-playing and flag-raising, a quick check of the situation disclosed exactly ten recruits making their debut in the regular line-up. This comprised only the players of no previous major league experience, the survivors of at least 200 ambitious youngsters given trials in the training camps.

The chances are that no more than ten rookies, though possibly as many as a dozen, will win the distinction of starting as regulars in the 1930 pennant races. It takes phenomenal work by a newcomer to turn the trick. Many of those lucky enough to make impressive starts are not fortunate enough to finish as regulars.

Here are the few players most likely to step into the spotlight April 15 as regulars, on the basis of what they have shown in camp:

Pittsburgh—Gus Suhr, first base.

New York Yankees—Ben Chapman, third base; Allen Cooke, outfield.

New York Giants—Marshall, second base.

Detroit—Elias Funk, outfield; Bill Rogell, shortstop; George Renss, catcher. (Funk and Rogell were up with other clubs.)

St. Louis Browns—Fred Bennett, outfield.

Boston Braves—Walter Berger, outfield.

Boston Red Sox—Tom Oliver, outfield; Bill Sweeney, first base.

Chicago White Sox—Smead Jolley, outfield; Irving Jeffries, infield.

Brooklyn—Alfonso Lopez, catcher.

This list does not include the pitching prospects which are more difficult to make any forecast about until they have been put to actual test. Among the twirling newcomers who seem slated for regular employment are Mahaffey, Athletics; Miss Nelson and Teachout, Cubs; Gomez and Wyatt, Tigers; Prager, White Sox; Lindsey, Cardinals; Campbell, Reds.

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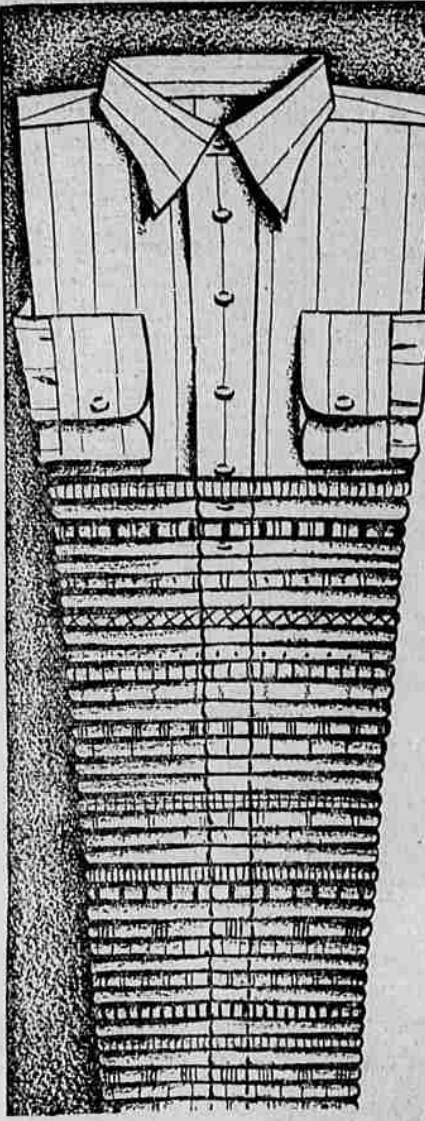
