Escalloped Meat and Rice

- Serving 6.
4 tablespoons butter,
5 tablespoons flour,
1-2 teaspoon salt,
1-4 teaspoon pepper,
2 cups milk,
1-2 cup gravy,
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion.
- 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers,
1-2 cups cooked, diced meat,
2 cups cooked rice,
Melt the butter and add the flour, salt and pepper. Add the milk and cook until a creamy sauce forms. Add the rest of the ingredients and pour into a buttered shallow pan. Bake for 25 minutes in a moderate oven.
- Any leftover vegetables can be added to this dish, if desired.

Custard Sauce for Leftover Cake

- 1-3 cup sugar,
2 tablespoons flour,
1-8 teaspoon salt,
1-4 teaspoon nutmeg,
1 egg,
1-4 cups milk,
1 teaspoon vanilla,
1 teaspoon butter.
