WASHINGTON, Apr. 7 (Special)—Wheat markets strengthened materially during the week ending April 5, influenced principally by less favorable crop prospects and an improved demand, according to the weekly grain market review of the United States bureau of agricultural economics.

Reports of deterioration in the winter wheat areas of the United States as a result of dry weather was the principal strengthening factor in the wheat market.
